
**Accident to Traffic Cop.**

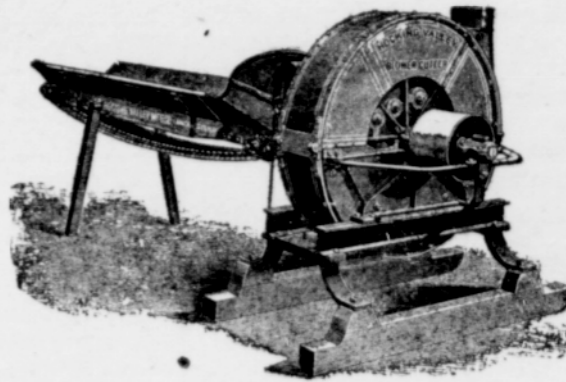
