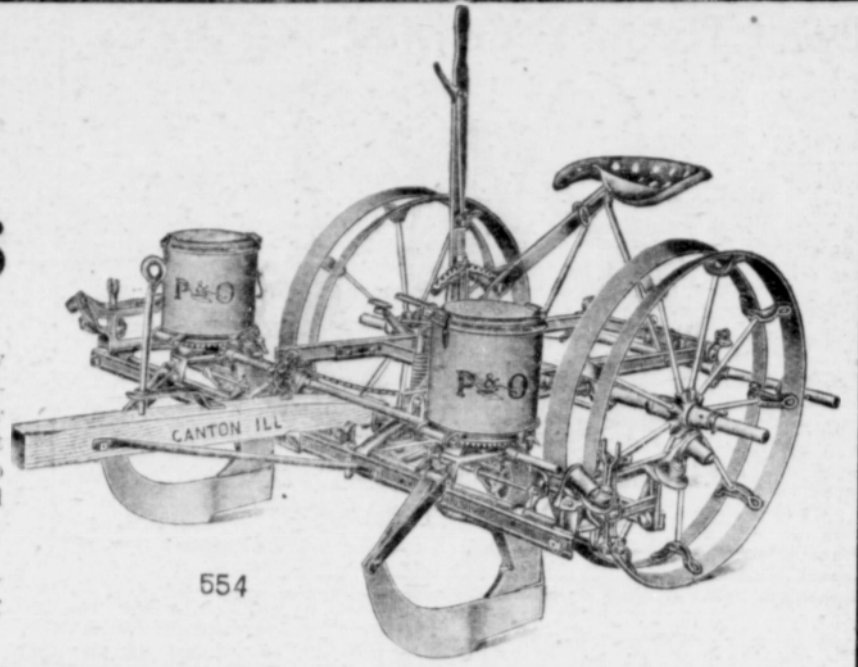
Mrs. Frank Morse, who has not been very well for some time is at the Schrevel sanatorium where with the expert care and treatment to be had there, she expects to improve fast.
