### Thinks Philippines Ready for Self-Government.

Here is what Governor Harrison, who has been for six years governor general of the islands, said on the subject of Philippine independence while speaking at the Knickerbocker Club in New York

"By temperament, by experience, by financial ability, in every way the ten millions of Filipinos are entitled to be free from every government except of their own choice. They are intelligent enough to decide for themselves.

"I have found the native Filipino official to be honest, efficient and as capable of administering executive positions as any men I have met anywhere in the world.

"These officials are today governing one thousand municipalities and forty-two provinces, economically, efficiently, and for the good of the entire people. They have a native congress including many graduates of Yale, Princeton, Harvard and other American universities. Other members are graduates of Santo Tomas and other Philippine universities, and in education and ability they compare favorably with any I know.

"They have leaders like Speaker Osmena, of the house of Representatives, and President Quizon, of the Senate, who would adorn any office.

"The Philippines are away ahead of the United States in successful government ownership and operation of public utilities.
