URGES PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE

"The Philippine Islands offer a vast field for the extension of American industry and commerce in the Far East," says Rafael Palma, vice president of the Philippine Mission.

Mr. Palma is a sincere advocate of closer economic relations between the United States and the Philippines, and contends this can best be brought about by a final solution of the Philippine independence issue.

In opposition to the granting of independence at this time, Warren G. Harding of Ohio, the new chairman of the Senate committee on Philippines, said recently, "I am opposed to the guarantee by the United States of immediate or future independence of the Philippine Islands."

a graduate of Willamette University in the class of 1866. She told me of a trip over the Powell Valley road to Mt. Hood in company with friends of Portland and Salem in 1868, when she and Miss Fannie Case climbed to the top of the mountain, being the first women to accomplish the feat.

On Sunday afternoon we enjoyed a wonderful automobile ride through the beautiful streets of Salem, whose broad avenues and wealth of roses made a striking picture.

The trip would have been incomplete without a visit to the Lee Mission cemetery. There we read the inscriptions on the graves of many of the heroes and heroines of the early day. The very simplicity of their graves was impressive, and in keeping with the simple, sturdy lives which they lived.
