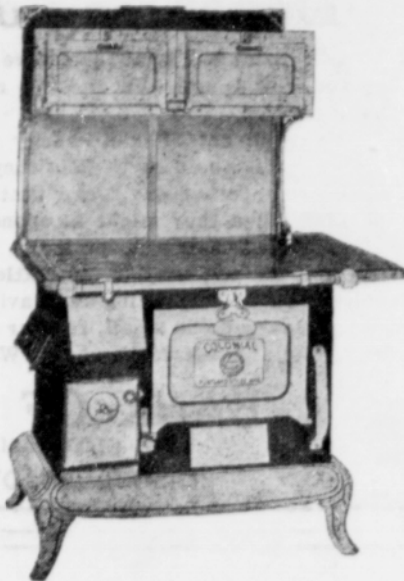

ROSE FESTIVAL WEEK VICTORY CELEBRATION

Ma and Pa Portland are entertaining this week. Sunday the Victory Rose Festival week began informally with a song reveille: Monday the Lane of Laughter opened, and the airplane squadron began its flight from Bakersfield, California. Its arrival in Portland is scheduled for today. The celebration will be opened officially on Wednesday by the Liberty Goddess who will arrive at noon on the flagship Minneapolis. The unveiling of the statue of Victory will follow. A big industrial parade will be given in the afternoon. Thursday is of unusual interest to all. The big military parade of the world war veterans, soldiers, sailors and marines, led by Governor Olcott, begins at 2:30 o'clock on that day. Rose day is Friday. Flowers will be displayed in floats of all descriptions. There will be in the parade several bands including the Killies band and Red Cross band. Decorated saddle horses with girl riders and boy riders, flower-covered autos, carriages, carts, trucks, motorcycles and even an airplane will be in the parade. There will also be in the line of march entries from civic organizations, lodges, clubs, public schools and Sunday schools.

New Law on Lighting.

Notice is hereby given that by virtue of authority of General Laws of Oregon for 1919, Chapter 181, effective May 29, 1919, entitled, "To require owners, lessees and operators of places of employment to provide emergency and general natural and artificial lighting; defining how the minimum of light shall be established; requiring the commissioner of labor and inspector of factories and workshops to enforce the same; and providing a penalty for failure to comply with the provisions of this act."

Three persons have been appointed, namely, F. C. Knapp, president Peninsula Lumber Co., representing the manufacturing interests; Vern H. Haybarker, representing the operating electrical workers, and F. H. Murphy, an electrical engineer, who will on the 28th day of June, 1919, at Room 501 Courthouse, Portland, at 2 p. m. o'clock, hold a public meeting to give hearing to those interested and to be advised in order to establish, to rearrange or readjust the schedule of lighting values and rules.

The demand for farm help according to the latest Bulletin of the U. S. Department of Labor, still exceeds the supply that is available at this time. There are several calls this week for milkers at wages ranging from \$75 to \$100 per month with room and board for experienced men. While no calls have yet been received for workers in the harvest fields, the cutting of alfalfa is just beginning in the eastern part of the state and haying in the Willamette valley will be in full swing in about 10 days from today with wages ranging from \$3 to \$5 per day.

BOY SCOUT WEEK A DRIVE FOR MEMBERS

Each year the Boy Scout movement turns out thousands of better boys and the finest types of future American patriots, for not only are they taught useful knowledge and training which fits them to better cope with the problems of life, but there are instilled in them the duties and obligations and high ideals of American citizenship.

The associate membership is offered at \$1.00. A larger fee may be paid if one desires to make a contribution to the movement. The fee legally identifies one with the Boy Scouts. 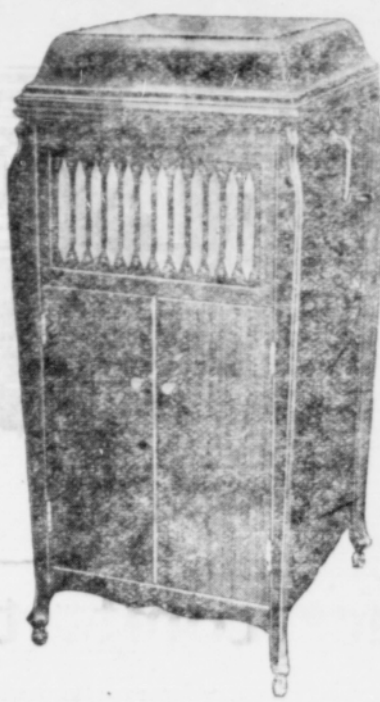

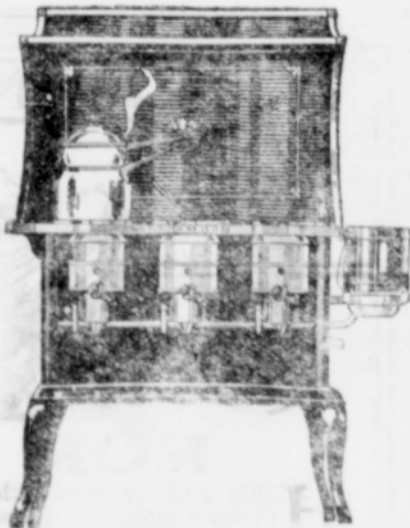
