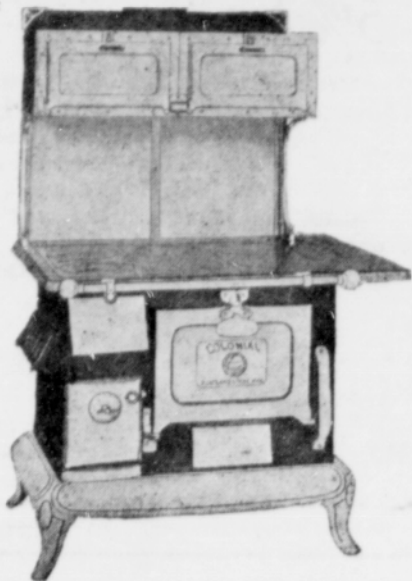

**SUMMER READING AT LIBRARY**

At the town library, on the shelf for summer reading, are many delightful books, a few of them serious—stories old and new. There are also books of poems for the lover of verse.

The one who contemplates camping out during the summer, and who is not master of all secrets of a successful outing, should read Miller's "Camp Craft." Then, when he has packed up for the trip, of course, some book must be put in with the frying pan and coffee pot; for, no matter how uncivilized he plans to be while far away from the maddening crowd, the civilized hunger for reading will come. The choice of book depends entirely upon individual taste. But the shelf at the library contains books that fill the requirements of the majority of book lovers.

Quite in keeping with life in the wilds is a story by a woman homesteader, "Letters on an Elk Hunt." What could be more suggestive of a quiet, peaceful summer day away from the haunts of man than such titles as "The Green Trails," and "Upland Pastures"? "The Inn of Tranquility" and "The Lay of the Land" convey a woody restfulness. "Shandygaff," "Among Friends," and "The Patient Observer" are easy reading essays. Martha E. Martin's book on "The Friendly Stars" will suit the amateur astronomer. At night, from his bed of sweet cedar boughs, he can gaze at those stars, feeling more friendly than ever. Among books of poetry are "Rhymes of a Red Cross Man," "A Little Book of Modern Verse," "Collected Poems," and John Kendrick Bangs' "Songs of Cheer."

To the stay-at-home these books are equally delightful, if not more so than to the camper, since they bring the out-of-doors with them. Whether at home or on the hills "Sunshine, Sketches of a Little Town," "Wind on the Willows" and "Dream Days" are pleasant summer books.

The shelf has something too for the one who likes more weighty reading such as: Dickens' "Our Mutual Friend," "The New Freedom" by Woodrow Wilson, Elliot's "Romola" and "Ninety-Three," Victor Hugo's story of the French Revolution. Two books that add interest to the ever interesting immigrant question are: Steiner's "The Immigrant Tide—Its Ebb and Flow" and the autobiography of the Syrian Ribhany "A Far Journey."

Another two books not instructive but inspirational are Dean Hole's "A Book About Roses" and Walter Wright's "Popular Garden Flowers." The war story is also there—"Sonia Between Two Worlds" by McKenna. A story of a group of boys first in the public school, later at Oxford, and later still, on the battlefields of France. Sonia, the heroine, through the crucible of war is transformed from a frivolous girl into a serious and strong character.

Dallas L. Sharp has a book on the shelf. It is called "The Hills of Hingham." Mr. Sharp is a lover of nature. In beginning the writing of his story he says he "had intended to set forth some features of the Earth that make it to be preferred to Heaven as a present place of abode" then "suddenly the war broke out, the gates of hell swung wide open into Belgium, and Heaven began to seem a better place. 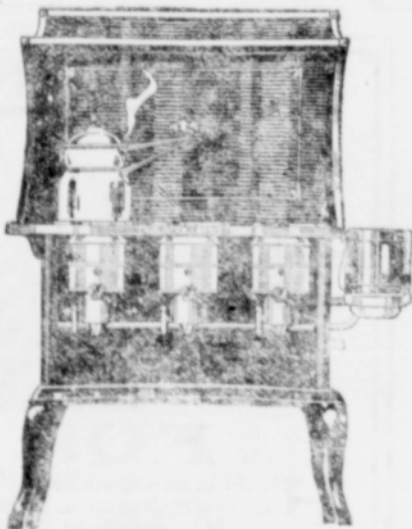
