BRIGHT DAYS AHEAD FOR WOOL.

According to the weekly letter of the National Wool Warehouse and Storage Co., the wool markets indicate a general strength of the staples the world over.

Shoddy and cheap cloth has been all the public could get for months and it is now crying for good wools again.

There is a great future for wool growing and every Western farm should have its flock of sheep.

A fine demand exists for the new wool clip which in many sections has been largely disposed of at high figures.

As a result interest in sheep raising is increasing and small flocks are going in on nearly every farm.

In a bulletin sent out this week by the U. S. Employment Service Bureau, located at 75 Third Street, Portland, there are listed calls for laborers in a number of places.

In the Farm Labor section requests are on the boards for general farm hands and milkers with wages at \$60 to \$75 per month.

From the lumber mills and woods come calls for men in almost every line of activity in the lumber industry.

There is a strong demand this week for laborers and teamsters on a number of highway construction sections where the regular wage runs from \$4 to \$4.50 per day.

The Federal employment agent at Hood River reports pickers coming in in large numbers just now, but says he can place from 100 to 200 aside from those in sight about the middle of the week when some of the late fields begin picking.

The high price and steady demand for wool has demonstrated that accumulated war stocks are not flooding the market as predicted and that it will be a long time to come before the world has enough wool on hand to supply normal needs.

The apple crop this year promises to be the largest in the history of the state.
