### POULTRY CLUB BOYS ADVISE WITH EXPERT

The champion Poultry club members, boys and girls from Gresham school, picnicked at the home of their leader, Mrs. H. H. Eling, on Wednesday. In the afternoon a cross-country jaunt took them over to the poultry plant of A. R. Lyman on Powell Valley road.

From Mr. Lyman the children received some valuable information on judging poultry. They visited the different runs and pens, viewing fowls from two weeks to a year and a half old. In each pen Mr. Lyman selected the best chickens, explaining their points to the amateurs and advising with them as to their preparations for exhibiting at the county fair.

Mr. Lyman is rather a specialist on pullets. Where many breeders consider it profitable to keep a hen two, and possibly three years, Mr. Lyman prefers to give all his attention to making a hen pay him a handsome profit during her first year of laying. Unless she has some especially fine points, she is then turned over to the market man for table use. For by that time Mr. Lyman has a new batch of promising pullets all ready and willing to lay.

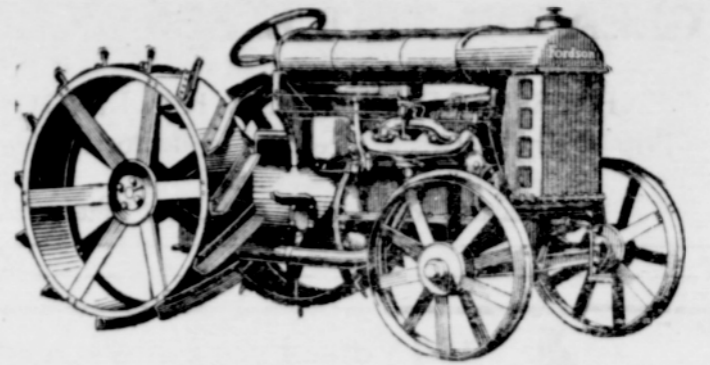
