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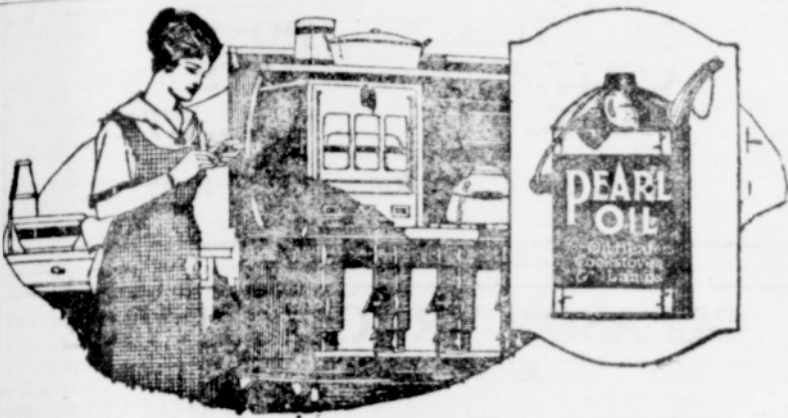

feed, makes a monthly total of \$31, not including the other items of expense mentioned. Upon his basis of 16 cows, when included cost items of everything, and not considering the chance of losing anything, he would have a net loss of \$81.

Feed cost per cow varied from 60c a day to \$1.10.

Other figures were presented to show that the cost of feed, machinery, and other dairy necessities have increased nearly 110 per cent in the last four years, while the wholesale price of milk has been lifted only 60 per cent. It was to meet this apparent deficit in the business that Friday's action was taken.

In the afternoon the League voted to increase the capital stock to \$50,000, so that the surplus milk can be taken care of, either as condensed milk or milk in storage. It was also decided to buy up eggs for cold storage, a report showing that the Hazelwood creamery net \$600 every day they buy eggs.

An advertising campaign will begin soon, to make known the value of milk as a health drink, and to show that, food value considered, milk is the cheapest food on the market. As an illustration of this latter fact, may be cited that: three-fifths of a pound of ham, three-fourths pound beef steak, four-fifths pound pork chops, 1 pint canned oysters, 2 pounds codfish, 8 eggs, each have the same food value as one quart of 4% milk. Upon the present basis, the best steak is the cheapest, costing 19 cents, and the equivalent food value in milk costs only 15 cents.

They have "batched it" together in the Eastern Oregon desert and have had many other experiences in common.

In 1884 Charles Powell married Miss Carrie Rook, the daughter of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Rook, who had come to Oregon by ox team from Tennessee in 1854.

They had located up near Pleasant Home, which neighborhood was known as Egypt because of the dense forest there. The year after their marriage Mrs. Jackson Powell passed away and in 1890 Jackson Powell crossed the divide, after a life full of eventful happenings. He was one of the Whitman massacre, that went to the aid of the missionary. They arrived too late to be of service, after an exciting trip in company with a regiment of soldiers from the Vancouver Barracks.

Upon the death of the pioneer the holdings were divided up between the two sons and two daughters. Chas. Powell had built a home there for his bride and there they have remained. The Tarr farm is also part of the estate. The Fred Powells have just completed a charming bungalow near the home of their parents. None of the original claim has been sold; it is all held by Jackson Powell's descendants.
