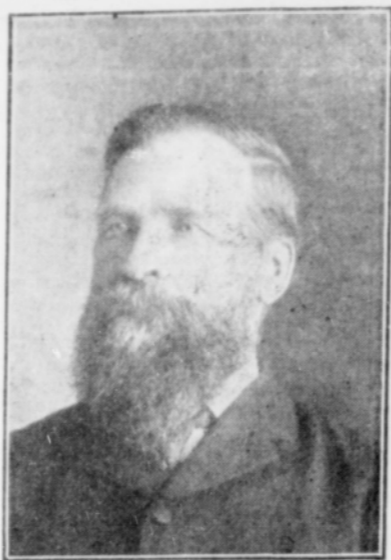

**John K. Honey Arrives Home.**

John K. Honey is expected home tonight. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Honey, took an early train this morning to Hood River. They will ferry across the Columbia to Whit Salmon and there meet the North Bank train bearing their son.

Of all of Gresham's long list of honored soldiers none has, perhaps, had a more thrilling experience than John Honey. He left his college work at Leland Stanford and enlisted when the United States entered the war, and was rejected because of defective vision. Again he tried to get into the service and was again rejected. Nothing daunted, he came home and joined the Friends of France, a non-military organization formed in Portland to do ambulance work. He went to New York with his unit and was there forced to see them sail away without him, because he had overlooked the little formality of getting released by his exemption board.

It took about two weeks to get the necessary papers to New York and to have his passport duly signed and sealed. On arriving in Paris he rejoined his unit, which was soon taken over by the government and which was sent at once to operate with the French in the vicinity of Rheims. Here he saw continuous service under war conditions for nearly a year and received the "corps d'armee" citation for the Croix-de-Guerre. He has been studying in Paris since receiving his discharge at that place. His home coming was by way of Gibraltar, where he spent a day or two.

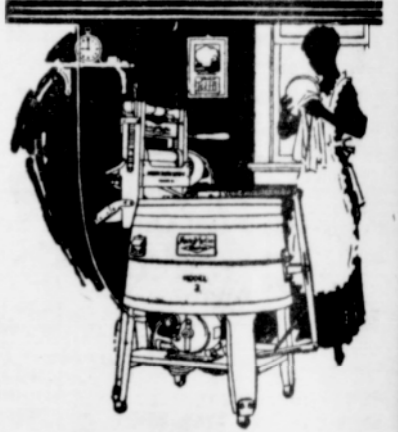
**RAKER'S GARAGE THIEF CONFESSES ROBBERY**
