**GRESHAM MARKET**

Striking Facts as to Suffrage are Pointed Out.

Here are some of the striking facts in regard to the passage of the resolution for the proposed woman suffrage amendment:

Amendment passed Senate just 41 years after its first introduction there. Extra session of Congress breaks records in speedy disposition of the suffrage measure.

Passed Senate June 5 by 56 to 25.

Passed House May 21, third day after session opened, 394 to 89.

In Senate vote shows 36 Republicans voted for it and 20 Democrats for it while eight republicans voted against and 17 democrats against.

In the house 299 republicans were for it and 102 Democrats, one independent and one prohibitionist for it while 70 Democrats voted and only 19 Republicans against.

Republicans leaders were overwhelmed with congratulations for bringing about quick and decisive action on the proposed amendment.

Efforts to delay the vote made by Senator Underwood and others prove unavailing.

Women will now carry to the states the fight for the ratification of the amendment.

To California, in the person of United States Senator Aaron A. Sargent, belongs the credit of first introducing the Susan B. Anthony amendment. Senator Sargent, who was elected to the Senate in 1873, introduced Miss Anthony's bill in 1878, and the culmination of the forty year effort came on June 4th. Miss Mary Garrett Hay, who has been untiring in her efforts to secure the passage of the amendment and who is now a member of the Republican Women's National Executive Committee, was one of the women chosen by the National American Woman Suffrage Association to represent that organization when the measure was signed by Vice-President Marshall.

**Farmers Mutual Makes Big Gain.**

The annual report of the Farmers Mutual Fire Relief Ass'n of Portland filed with the Insurance Department of Oregon shows \$1,301,534.00 insurance written by the Ass'n in 1918, and 475 new members gained during the year. The Ass'n is now in its 15th year, and has about five million insurance in force.

Since its organization, the Ass'n has made an annual saving of over 50% as compared with board rates on farm insurance, to its members. H. W. **Lumber Mills Refusing Orders.**

Producers of west coast lumber are over-sold. Orders have exceeded production for the past two months. Mill stocks are depleted. Physical conditions of manufacturing properties necessitate such extensive repairs during July and August that heavily restricted immediate production is certain.

Notwithstanding the heavy volume of business booked and offering, the industry, as a whole, is not prosperous. Costs, held somewhat in check on a high level, through governmental regulations during war times, are again showing disposition to pyramid. The composite cost statement of forty-three representative mills for the month of April, shows that the production of a thousand feet of lumber cost \$21.54. The composite sales report of the same mills indicate a return of \$20.88 per thousand feet, or, considering the bulk of the industry a loss of eighty-six cents on every thousand feet of lumber manufactured during the month of April.

The condition of the lumber industry shows that there is no likelihood of lumber being cheaper in the near future. Steel has advanced and copper is advancing. The man who now holds up building operations awaiting a drop in prices, has a long wait ahead.

**Wool Brings High Prices.**

Over 3,000,000 pounds of government wool was sold at auction June 10 at the Portland Columbia Basin Wool Warehouse. It was the most successful of three sales and on scoured wool basis brought higher prices than at the recent Boston auction.

When it is realized that Portland is second only to Boston as a wool center, the present demand for wool speaks well for the future of the wool industry in western states.

Growers are realizing the advantage of grading up flocks whose fleeces command the highest price. This coupled with modern grading and warehousing such as the Columbia Basin affords gives the grower every penny there is in his wool clip.

Oregon has entered into a cooperative agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture to determine, grow and distribute for seed purposes the best varieties of potatoes under Oregon conditions. The work will be conducted through the experiment station of the Agricultural College, with G. R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops, in charge.

"This joint action has grown out of the need felt by farmers throughout the state for good seed potatoes free of disease," said Professor Hyslop. "The cooperative potato experiment is to make available for growers good seed potatoes."
