Lester Richey has gone to southern Oregon.

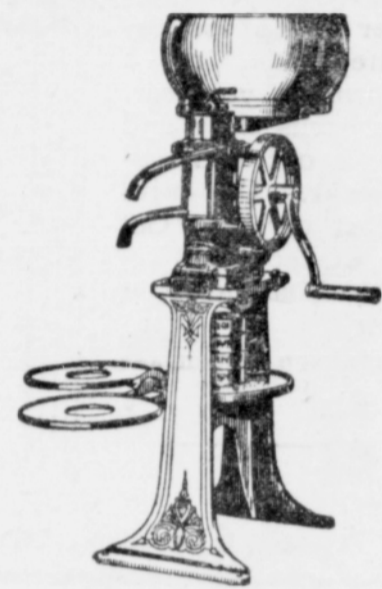
July 8, a baby girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hoffee of Rockwood.

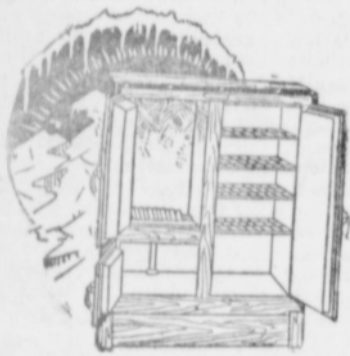
