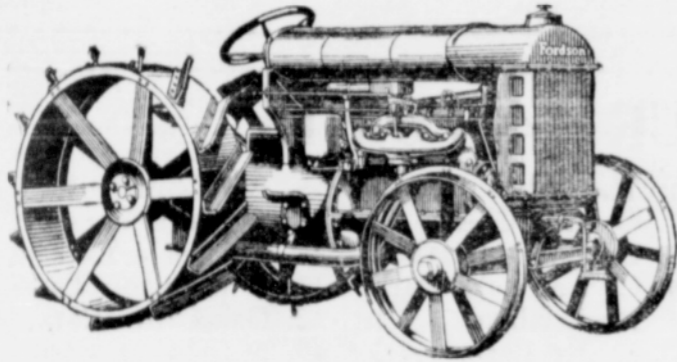

GRANGERS ENJOY DAY AT THE CHAUTAUQUA

More than 100 grangers from different parts of the state responded to the call of grange day at the Gladstone chautauqua last Wednesday.

The early part of the morning was given over to the usual greetings of the members. At 11 o'clock during the forum hour, John C. Ketcham, National lecturer, gave a most interesting address, his topic being "The Farmer and the Reconstruction Program."

Mr. Ketcham is a most sincere and convincing speaker. He advocated a closer organization of the agricultural interests, declaring it to be the only means of lowering the high cost of living. By closer organization, he contended that the producer would always realize the cost of production plus a fair profit the cost of marketing would be at the minimum and the consumer would be able to buy at a reasonable price. He lamented the fact that in the articles of the League of Nations, not one word can be found referring to agriculture, while labor has been given especial consideration. This was due to imperfect organization. He predicted troublesome times ahead during the reconstruction period but declared the tillers of the soil would not fail to do their part in holding the wheel of state to its steady course, since evolution and not revolution was the predominant tone of all grange organizations.

The noon hour was enjoyed at the permanent grange headquarters with the usual loaded table of good eats, followed by the singing of America.

The afternoon and evening although not pertaining directly to agricultural interests was most enjoyable. A military quartet composed of four boys, picked from 40,000 at Camp Lewis was the musical attraction, which was in a class of its own. The afternoon lecture by Dr. Elliott Boyd on "The Effect of the Unseen Forces," was most inspiring. In the evening, Edwin Whitney, gave a dramatic reading of "Turn to the Right." He impersonated 12 characters and appeared as a star in each of them.

Lieutenant Roberts Home.

Lieutenant Kenneth Roberts arrived in Gresham, Tuesday evening after two years service in France. In August 1917, he was sent overseas with the 18th Railway Engineers, but was transferred later to the 543d company. He was sent with his company to Dijon where he entered school for a three-months' course in engineering, preparatory to going to the front lines. The armistice was signed in the meantime, but at the completion of his course he was made second lieutenant. Lieutenant Roberts has volumes of interesting matter to tell, having visited the big battlefields and cities of historical importance.

Wedding at Crown Point.

Thursday afternoon, at Crown Point Chalet, Miss Dorris Johnson and William J. Read, both of Portland were married by Justice of Peace John Brown of Gresham. The wedding ceremony was read on the front porch of the chalet, the beautiful Columbia river spilling its approval. Mrs. Henderson served a special chalet dinner to the bridal party.

Oren Stanley fell out of a cherry tree, scratching his face quite badly. He is wearing his face bandaged up to prevent threatened infection.

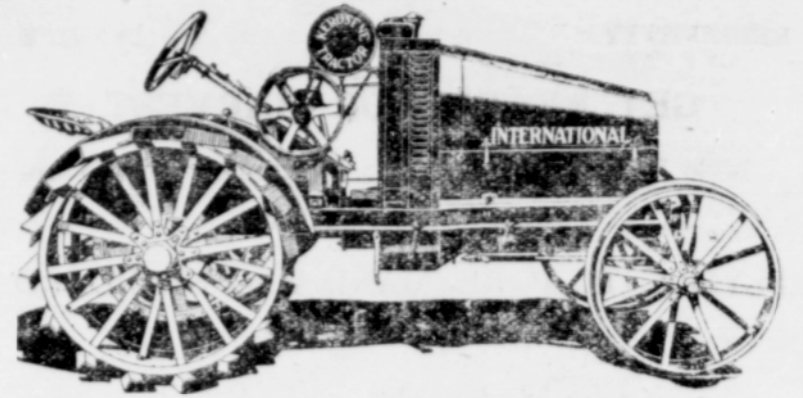
Poultrymen Meet Tonight.

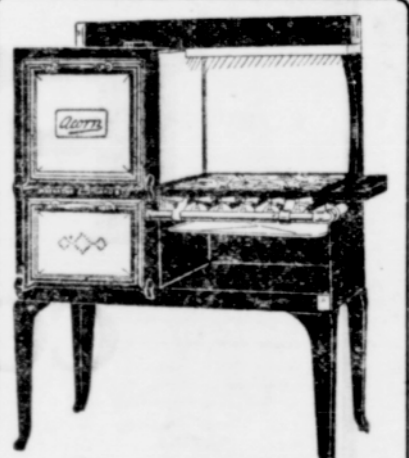

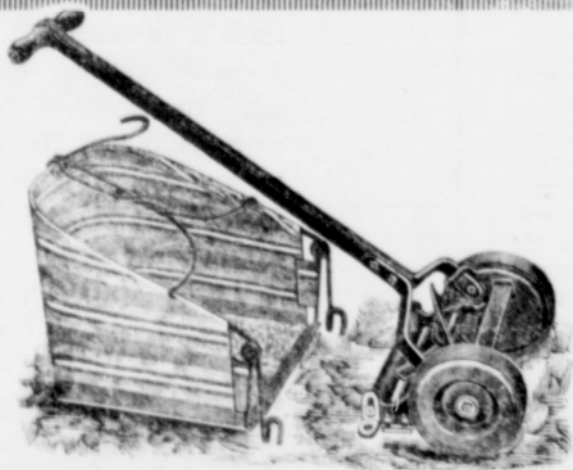
