WHY NOT ORGANIZE HERE? A post of the American Legion, the national organization of ex-service men, in every county in the state of Oregon by August 20, is the goal which has been set by State Secretary Dow V. Walker of Portland in an announcement to the press today. This means that Oregon, with more than 30,000 prospective members of the American Legion, will be well organized by the state convention which is planned for September. Already applications for charters have been forwarded to national headquarters at New York from 16 local posts and as many more will be sent from state headquarters again shortly. In every county where there is no post as yet, one ex-service man is being chosen by Mr. Walker as county organizer, whose duty will be to see that former soldiers, sailors or marines in his locality get together as soon as possible. In counties where there already are posts, the members of the executive committee of the post first organized in the county are automatically designated a county committee to attend to the organization of other branches throughout the county and the president of that post becomes county organizer. In other words, the state organization is responsible for the organization of at least one post in every county and members of that post are responsible for the development of the American Legion in other parts of their county. Any town in which there are fifteen ex-service men to band together may form a local post and make application to the headquarters of the state committee, Liberty Temple, Portland, for a charter. These applications are approved, numbered and sent to New York for final approval and issuance by the national committee of the American Legion. By August 20, a post in every county, and by August 30, a post in every town or locality having furnished more than 100 men in the world war, is the aim of Mr. Walker. A membership drive throughout the nation for 1,000,000 members, or about 25 per cent of the service men of the country, will be staged by the American Legion in September, during which month the Oregon state convention will be held in Portland. The national convention of the American Legion will be held in Minneapolis, on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the armistice. Gresham should be the location of one of those posts. First Oregon Unit Farm. Ground for the first farm unit has been broken by the Oregon land settlement commission on the 60-acre unit farm three miles south of Independence. farm house, barn, machine shed, poultry and hog houses, and a home garden and family orchard, occupies three and one-half acres. It is located convenient for farm work and accessible to the highway. The farmstead and the farm generally is gently rolling, with a well-drained northeasterly slope. The plans call for a well diversified farm such as a man and family can handle with a minimum of extra help. A crop rotation system is a definite part of the plan. The entire tract now bears a wheat chop, which was planted when the land was purchased by the commission last fall. The farm system and farmstead were planned by H. D. Scudder, chief in farm management at the Agricultural College and agricultural advisor of the commission. Claire Wilkes and Palmer Patton, of the farm management department, are assisting in supervising the building and farming operations. It is the intention of the commission to establish farm units in various parts of the state, as authorized by the land settlement acts of the legislature. During 1918, 39,000,000 barrels of oil were imported from foreign countries and 27,000,000 barrels were withdrawn from stocks, and indications are that peace time demands are heavier than war needs.
