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REMINISCENT

Many of our readers have expressed their appreciation of the pioneer stories running in the Outlook. Most of the credit rightfully goes to the writer, Marion Dudley Eling, whose versatility as a writer is making these articles exceptionally interesting and reliable.

The editor is not old enough nor has he lived long enough in Gresham to be reminiscent of the pioneer people and conditions. Mrs. Eling is younger and newer still to this locality but has the happy faculty of gathering the facts about the early settlers and making them vivid.

We are glad this is being done while a few of the early pioneers are left to tell the story of the privations and hardships experienced on the trails and in the settlements back in the 40s, 50s and 60s. As is always the case some persons toiled and sacrificed and suffered to lay the foundations good and strong for future generations. They were working out their own destiny and happiness at the time, perhaps, not seeing far into the future, but a kind providence led them, a providence we think kinder to us than to them.

We cannot think of our work being as heroic as theirs, yet we sometimes wonder if we are not the pioneers of generations to come; if what we are doing, apparently to meet the necessities laid upon us, may not be laying the foundation work for the development and greatness of the future.

Surely no one can read thoughtfully the stories of early experiences of the first settlers here and not feel a reverent respect for their memories and a sincere purpose in trying to emulate their worthy examples.

The ninth annual Pacific International Live Stock Exposition is announced to be held in Portland on November 17 to 22, 1919, in the new \$250,000 building erected for that purpose in North Portland. Entries close October 15. Over \$65,000 in cash premiums is being offered.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

"The people of this nation must be relieved of the high cost of living. Rich and poor alike are being robbed by exorbitant prices. Millions of the common people have been living on half rations because of their inability to purchase food." So said Representative Edwin D. Rickitts of Ohio in introducing a bill in the House which places all corporations or agencies for the production, sale and distribution of live stock under governmental license and regulation.

Another instance showing how the high costs of food have aroused our law makers is shown in the resolution introduced in the House by Representative Wood of Indiana in which he charges the President with violating the law enacted by Congress in permitting Secretary of War Baker and Food Administrator Hoover to hold up the sale of immense government stores of canned goods and meats.

The president was authorized, it is claimed, in the national security

and defense act of 1917 to secure an equitable and fair distribution of food, to provide storage facilities for it, sell it for cash at reasonable prices, and prevent the hoarding of it, his authority to end only with his proclamation that the war with Germany has terminated.

Wood declares that the government supply of canned goods is held up until this year's vegetables have been canned, and that meats and fats are to be disposed of in order to maintain a steady flow to the market and that this has increased the cost of living.
