The Outlook office is in receipt of a copy of the 1919 Oregon Blue Book, issued by the secretary of state. It is a 299-page book covering a wide range of subjects and a great amount of statistical matter relative mainly to Oregon. There is also considerable general information that every citizen of Oregon should have at close hand.

The book gives a condensed history of Oregon; a complete list and description of all state institutions; a list of all state officers; all information regarding courts, legislative assembly, military forces, etc.; tax and land information; election requirements; list of postoffices; list of newspapers; and much information regarding schools, charitable organizations, state boards, etc.

Every home should possess a copy. A careful study of it and use as a reference book will make for a more intelligent citizenry. A copy will be sent free to any citizen of Oregon on application to the secretary of state's office.

We have bought from the Government a supply of these Grenades, from which the deadly TNT has been removed, and they have been made into Savings Banks.

We will be very glad to make you a present of one of these banks if you will comply with the conditions imposed by the Government governing their distribution.

The Government requires that persons receiving these banks make purchases as follows:

- Persons 12 years or under, One War Savings Stamp.
- Persons 13 to 18 years, Two War Savings Stamps.
- Persons 18 years or over, One \$100 Treasury Certificate.

We have been assured that these banks will reach us in October, but as the supply is limited we suggest that you telephone us your reservation of one of these banks. After they arrive you can make the purchase of War Savings Stamps and Certificates as required.
