MONDAY, WILSON DAY AT MULTNOMAH COUNTY FAIR; OTHER BIG EVENTS DAILY

Today Manager C. D. Minton received a telephone message from the committee arranging President Wilson's schedule in Portland which gave the assurance that the President and his party will be in Gresham at 11:45 Monday forenoon. They will drive in along Main Street, turning at Fifth into the fair grounds and going around the race track, giving those on the streets and on the grounds a good view of our chief executive.

Those of us who were so keenly disappointed because we did not draw admission to the Portland auditorium where President Wilson will speak in the evening, will take some measure of comfort from this opportunity to see the President, in our own little town, surely the biggest honor that has ever come to Gresham. And, according to the official program being published, Mr. Wilson will speak for 15 minutes at the fair grounds.

With such an auspicious beginning Monday, the opening day of the fair will be a big one. Second in importance will be the children's pageant parade by the members of the industrial clubs, hair-raising chariot races at 3 o'clock and a band concert in the evening. For this day, called Wilson day on the program, but originally called Children's day all children under 16 years will be admitted free of charge.

For Tuesday, or Gresham day, a large band of Indians will give a performance in line with their customs, both afternoon and evening. In addition to the chariot races, there will be horse relay races in the afternoon. The band concert and Indian dances are scheduled for the evening.

President H. A. Lewis announces that arrangements have been made for entrance to the fair grounds on Second street as well as on Fifth street. Autos in limited numbers may be parked in the grove adjoining the Second street entrance. An acre on the S. S. Thompson property has been secured for this purpose.

An extension of time has been allowed stock exhibitors. Entries of live stock will be open until Saturday night, September 13. Season tickets are now on sale at the office on the fair grounds. Those who intend buying them are urged to do so this week, as the gates will close Saturday evening.

Cooking, canning and sewing demonstrations will be given by club members during the week.

Tuesday at 2 p. m. the Holman school of Portland will give a canning demonstration. At 3:30 the Lynch cooking club will bake cake.

On Wednesday at 10:30, the Orient team, and at 2 p. m. the Clinton Kelly team will can each three pints of peaches and 3 pints of beans. At 3:30 o'clock the same day, Rockwood sewing club will make a needle

MORE CHANGES MADE IN DOMESTIC SCIENCE LIST

A number of items which were omitted from the premium list have been added to various classes in the domestic science department. The following are offered in crochet work:

Library table scarf in filet crochet, 1st prize, \$1; 2d prize, 50c. Collection of crochet yokes, 1st \$2; 2d \$1.

Under domestic baking the following are listed, offering prizes of \$1.50 for first and 75 cents for second place:

Fruit cake, coffee cake, nut cake, Angel cake, chocolate layer cake, Devils food layer cake, coconut layer cake, jelly roll, dozen raised doughnuts, dozen fried cakes, sunshine cake, jam cake.

The following will receive prizes of one dollar and 50 cents respectively for first and second winners.

Potato yeast bread, graham bread, steamed bread, nut bread. Baking powder biscuits, graham gems, dozen ginger cookies, dozen white sugar cookies.

Under class 73, preserves, pickles and canned fruits, all first prizes have been increased \$2 and all second prizes \$1.

Under the head of Old Ladies' Department there will be offered for prizes of two dollars and one dollar.

Patch work quilt, cotton, patch work quilt, wool or silk, bed spread, knitted or crocheted, and for prizes of one dollar and fifty cents respectively, piece in drawn work, one yard or more knit or crocheted lace, knitted socks, knitted stockings, fancy handkerchiefs, not less than three, embroidered sofa pillow, embroidered centerpiece, best piece tatting, knitted or crocheted mittens, knitted or crocheted shawl, best specimen darning, best specimen patching, child's dress, embroidered.

Baking for the fair will be received on the second day (Tuesday) up to 10 o'clock in the morning.

The Outlook will maintain a booth as usual at the fair, which will be a general information booth.

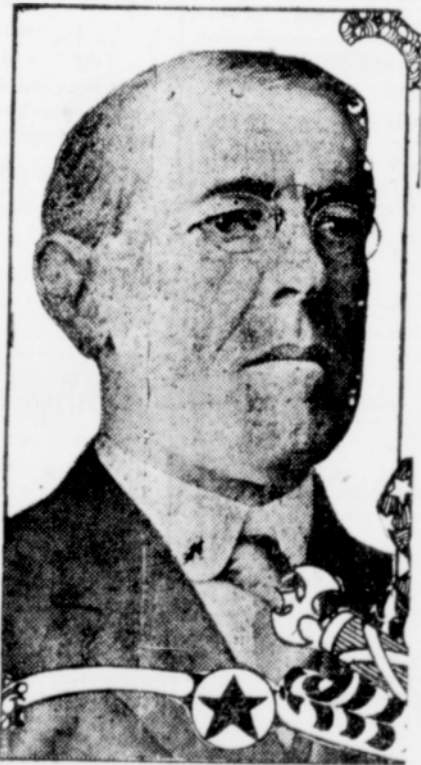
