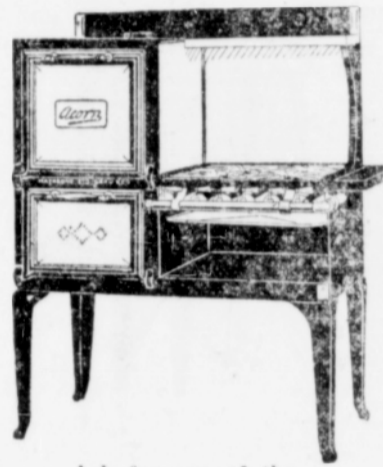

The next regular meeting will be held October 7. In the meantime there is a nation-wide campaign to increase the membership of the American Legion to one million in a drive beginning Monday, September 15 and ending September 29. Oregon's quota is 8742 members. Toward this number Gresham and vicinity could produce over 300 eligible service men.

The call has gone out to every post of the Legion in the state urging a special effort during that week, so that Oregon will not fall behind in the work of organization in which it already leads all but six states of the union.

Oregon's membership goal is based on the number of former soldiers, sailors and marines from this state, which reached the total of 37,856.

"We have stood together. Let's Stick Together," is the slogan of the world war veterans in this drive. Teams are being formed in every district, meetings planned—all with the co-operation of editors, merchants, employers and all good Americans who extended their co-operation in the Liberty Loan drives. The American Legion represents 4,800,000 men and women who offered their lives to safeguard the liberty they now enjoy.

Marshall Foch will present a banner to the state leading the country in the membership drive, at the nation convention at Minneapolis on November 11, American Legion Day. Gresham post is planning to have a booth at the fair where literature may be procured and membership cards filled out.
