West Wants Proof.

The Public Lands Committee of the senate has acted favorably on the bill for the leasing of Government-owned oil lands by a unanimous vote. Included in the bill are provisions which, when it becomes a law, will permit the owners of lawful claims to oil lands in the naval reserves to proceed with their development.

A ten year fight for a square deal and the right to produce oil, is represented in this measure.

When success seemed assured on previous occasions the vote getting cry of "conservation" was used to delay matters.

Development of oil fields in western states has been deliberately held up for ten years by professional politicians playing politics with the resources of these states.

Only the passage of the leasing bill will prove to the west that it is not still being used as a political football.

TRAVELERS ABROAD PAY INCOME TAX FIRST

Collector of Internal Revenue Milton A. Miller was yesterday advised that the requirements of the Internal Revenue Law, providing that aliens intending to go abroad must file a certificate of compliance with income tax laws before a sailing permit will be issued, has been extended to American citizens, and that Canada has joined the United States in a reciprocal agreement for strict enforcement of these Regulations.

This means, the Collector said, that the gates of embarkation are closed to all travelers who intend to proceed to foreign countries until they have secured an income tax clearance from the Internal Revenue Collector for the district in which they reside, and have secured from the Internal Revenue Agent in charge of the port of embarkation, a sailing permit which must be attached to their passport.

"Strict compliance with these Regulations," said Collector Miller, "mainly is in the interest of the traveler, because on arrival at the port of embarkation travelers have been and will be delayed and even denied embarkation on the boat on which they have reservations, unless they present their papers in proper form to the Revenue officer at the pier showing that income tax laws have been fully complied with."

In the case of American citizens, they must produce good and sufficient evidence of having filed an income tax return and payment of all taxes due for the year 1918; or in the absence of sufficient income to necessitate filing returns, must furnish evidence of the amount and nature of all income received.

Aliens desiring to go abroad must submit their passports to an Internal Revenue Collector together with evidence as to the income received by the traveler, which evidence may be in the form of letters from responsible employers showing amount of income received, evidence as to bank deposits, and withdrawals made, evidence in the form of doctors' certificates, hospital bills or similar documents in the case of loss of employments by reason of sickness, and, in general, the establishment of the applicant's actual net income to the satisfaction of the Collector. Non-resident aliens must show a clean income account for 1916, 1917, 1918, and that part of 1919 up to date of departure from the country.
