**Two Contagious Diseases of Cattle.**

There are two diseases of cattle not usually thought of, as contagious or infectious that are so in many cases, and prove quite a loss to cattle.

1. Mastitis, mammitis; caked udder or garget. This condition is not always infectious, but in a great many cases is so, and it is safer to regard it as dangerous than to run unnecessary risks.

The cow should be isolated and the hands of the milker washed and disinfected after milking cow thus infected. The milk should be drawn into a pail, rather than on floor and then either thrown away or hotted and fed to pigs.

The writer has seen many cases where this disease has spread to several cows in the same herd before the owner became aware of the infectiousness of trouble. The prevention is a great deal easier than the cure.

2. The other condition not always recognized as infectious is the disease characterized by sore feet, especially between toes at top of hoof, similar to foot rot in sheep. This condition is very common in milch cows and should be isolated, if she is allowed to run with the other cows the disease is very liable to spread to some of the other animals. It is more apt to be spread by means of some muddy place, through which the cattle pass than any other means.

These places should be very liberally covered with lime so as to disinfect them as much as possible. This condition in a cow is very stubborn to cure and causes quite a loss in flesh and in milk production.

Prevention is the best treatment.
