STATE FAIR VISITORS TO SEE MANY FORDSONS

Both farmers and dealers will find themselves interested in the big display of Fordson tractors and implements to be put on at the fair by the Valley Motor company, under the direction of Watt Shipp. For this purpose Mr. Shipp has secured the cooperation of the principal dealers of western Oregon from Portland to Roseburg, all of whom will contribute to the exhibit.

This will be installed in a special tent 35x70 in dimensions, in which will be found every type of the Fordson tractor and implement, among which one of the most interesting features will be a "cut-away" tractor showing every detail of the mechanism in operation. Experienced demonstrators will show the capacity of the machines on the grounds and plowing demonstrations will also be made on land outside the grounds. In these tests it is expected to duplicate or exceed the records previously made in Salem, and which secured for the Fordson tractor its acceptance by the state for the institution farms.

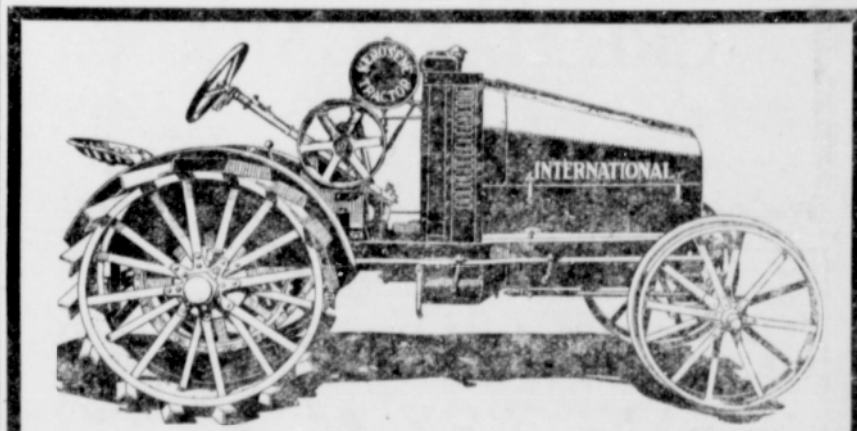
