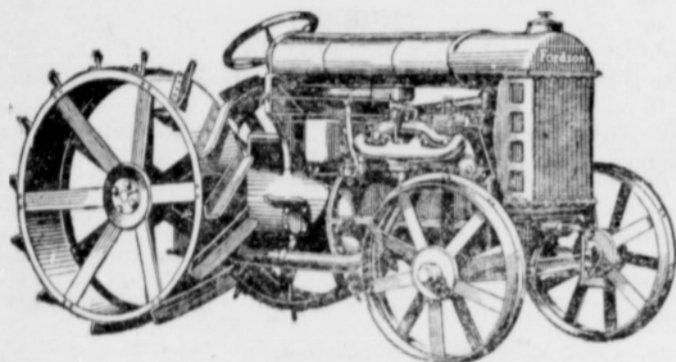

**Rural Carrier Examination.**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Clackamas, Oregon to be held at Portland on October 25, 1919 to fill the position of rural carrier at Boring and Estacada and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other postoffices in the above-named county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post-office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

Admission of women to this examination will be limited to the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines, and to the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of duty.
