Eighth grade—Estelle Johnson, Clara Hoffmeister, David Rolfe, Phillip Gran.

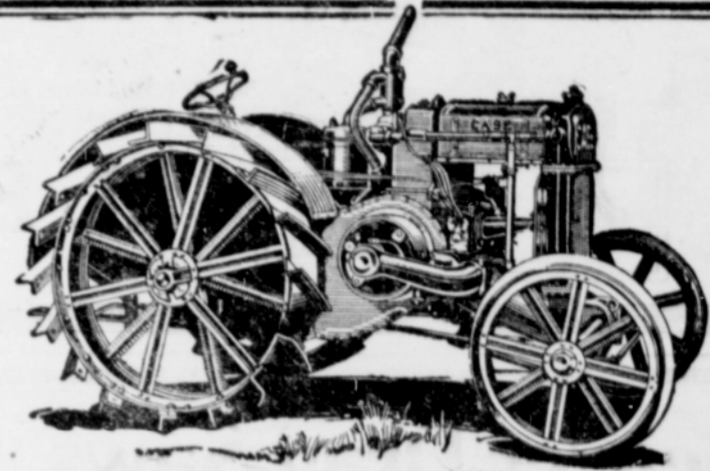
