

HOME BUILDERS ASSN. IS NOW INCORPORATED

The Gresham Home Builders association is now incorporated, its capital stock mostly subscribed, and it is now ready to elect a board of directors and officers and get down to the business for which it was organized. In other words the plan is now perfected, accepted and the movement launched—now for the success.

The plan seems to be excellent but it won't work itself. Human energy is needed to put it in operation. Approximately \$7500 of the \$10,000 capital stock has been pledged. The pledges should now be made. Subscriptions, with ten per cent advance and a note given covering the balance. The full \$10,000 should be subscribed at once. Enough men, or women, should come forward at once with subscriptions from \$50 to \$250 to make \$2500 yet unpledged.

Then there should be a jubilation and get-together meeting of all stockholders that would make the armistice celebration a tame affair.

The Outlook requested the privilege of printing the honor roll of subscribers.

The first eleven may be called the "eleven" as each has pledged a subscription of \$500.

The articles of incorporation are as follows:

Know All Men by These Presents that we, R. H. Todd, J. A. Pateneau and H. L. St. Clair, all residents of the state of Oregon, and citizens of the United States, do hereby join ourselves into a corporation under and by virtue of the general incorporation laws of the state of Oregon, and hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I. (Name)
The name of this corporation shall be the "Gresham Home Builders Association."

ARTICLE II. (Objects)
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed and its business and pursuits are and shall be:

First. To engage in the general building of homes and residences within the town of Gresham and the vicinity thereof in Multnomah county, state of Oregon.

Second. To buy, acquire and own such real estate as may be necessary for the building operations to be carried on and conducted by this corporation within the town of Gresham or its vicinity in Multnomah county, state of Oregon.

Third. To purchase all and every kind of building material including lumber, shingles, lime, plaster, sand, gravel, hardware, glass or any other material necessary or required in the erection and construction of buildings.

Fourth. To engage in the sale or lease of real estate or the sale and lease of the homes or residences to be built and constructed by this corporation.

Fifth. To borrow money and to use the promissory note of this corporation therefor, and to secure the same by pledges, by mortgage or other pledge of the real or personal property of this corporation. The funds so derived from such loans to be used in carrying on the corporate business and operations. To maintain an office within the town of Gresham for the transaction of the general business of the corporation.

Sixth. To subscribe for, take, purchase, own and hold the shares of stock of other corporations.

Seventh. To buy all tools, implements and machinery of any and all kinds and characters, whatsoever, requisite or necessary in carrying on the building operations of this corporation.

Eighth. And generally to do any and all things necessary or convenient for the carrying out and accomplishment of the general objects and purposes of this corporation to erect, build and complete homes for permanent residences within the town of Gresham and the vicinity thereof in Multnomah county, state of Oregon.

ARTICLE III.
The duration and time of existence of this corporation shall be unlimited.

ARTICLE IV.
The principal place of business of this corporation shall be located in the town of Gresham, Multnomah county, state of Oregon.

ARTICLE V.
The capital stock of this corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) divided into Two Hundred shares of the par value of Fifty dollars each.

ARTICLE VI.
That R. H. Todd, J. A. Pateneau and H. L. St. Clair, all residents of the state of Oregon, are designated as the incorporators who are to open books and receive subscriptions to the capital stock of this corporation.

The articles are duly signed and acknowledged.

3D ANNUAL RED CROSS ROLL CALL, NOV. 6 TO 11

Organization of the campaign committees for the coming Red Cross membership drive in the five counties under supervision of the Portland chapter of the American Red Cross is virtually complete according to a statement received from H. E. Witham, campaign chairman of the Portland chapter. Details of the work will be well in hand before the actual campaign opens next Thursday.

The goal sought in the counties of Clackamas, Columbia, Washington, Yamhill and Multnomah is 150,000 new members during the campaign, lasting from November 6 to 11. Each membership will be one dollar; the campaign being for members, not funds. With a membership as large as anticipated, the money received should insure the continuance during the coming year of the home service work of the Red Cross and the relief of returned soldiers and their dependents.

The distinction won by Oregon in 1918, by securing the highest percentage of membership in the Red Cross on a basis of population of any state in the union, by enrolling about 249,000 members, is one of which the state is proud. Leaders in the present campaign believe this record will be equalled, if not exceeded, during the third annual roll call.

Posts of the American Legion throughout Oregon have united with the Red Cross chapters and branches in their efforts to make the coming drive an unqualified success.

A record was made in the membership drive of the Red Cross last year in Clackamas county, when over 12,000 members were secured. This year, with the assistance of the American Legion, it is expected that the previous record will be maintained. There are 156 auxiliary managers appointed for work in Clackamas county.

Phil Hammond, chairman of Clackamas county Post No. 5 of the American Legion, has named Lou Henderson, as chairman of the drive committee for that post. Dr. Hugh Mount is chairman of the local chapter of the Red Cross and T. A. Sullivan has been named chairman of the Red Cross drive committee, assisted by Mrs. Thora B. Gardner and Mrs. Platt.

REPRESENTATIVE FESS



The distinguished Ohio statesman, Hon. Simon D. Fess, is chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee. He is joint author, with Senator Kenyon, Republican of Iowa, of the measure recently adopted by Congress providing for the vocational rehabilitation of persons disabled in industrial pursuits. Under this act, which is looked upon as one of the most progressive steps taken by Congress in behalf of the laboring class, \$1,000,000 will be distributed annually among the various states to teach new trades to those who have lost a limb or sustained other injuries which have incapacitated them for their former employment.

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UNION HIGH TRIMS WASHOUGAL 25 TO 0

After the licking received from the Hood River High, the Gresham boys came back Friday and showed that accidents will happen, by walling Washougal 25 to 0. A decided change in the play of the local football artists can be noticed, owing to the change to the eastern football formation from the old style. The effectiveness of this new style can be judged from the fact that Union High made yardage 19 times to the three for Washougal. Both teams played a good, clean game that kept the spectators on tiptoe from the opening whistles to the last down.

Washougal kicked off to Gresham and yardage was made three times before the ball was lost on downs. Washougal failed to make a yard through the line and a short punt gave Gresham the ball within easy striking distance. Two end runs by Peak and Strong netted 27 yards and a minute later a pass, Peak to Camp, scored the first six points, the goal kick being missed.

Washougal ruined the ball on the kick-off but lost it on a fumble. A pass, Peak to Johnson, and a line plunged by the fullback netted yardage. A 30-yard run by Peak placed the ball on the four-yard line and the quarter ended.

The second quarter opened with a touchdown, a pass to Brugger adding seven points for the total of 13. Gresham continued to march through Washougal's defense during the second quarter, but interrupted passes and the failure of a place kick kept Gresham from the scoring line.

The second half opened up with Washougal on the receiving end but after making yardage once the ball lost on downs. The ball changed hands a couple of times but Gresham, after receiving the ball on a punt, tore the opposing line to flinders and smashed its way for 50 yards for a touchdown—score 19 to 0. The remaining time was too short to allow Gresham to score again. The whole team showed up to a good advantage, working together like a machine and displaying the brand of fight that wins the game. Peak and Strong in the backfield tore through the line and around the end time after time for yardage and the good work of Peak in passing, and the ends, Camp and Brugger in holding the wet ball on critical passes was also noticeable.

In addition to the foregoing, 115 herds in Oregon and Washington had successfully passed one test prior to April 1, 1919. Many of these have undoubtedly passed additional tests since April, and have become eligible to the accredited herd list, but their transfer has not yet been announced by the Bureau. The next circular containing the accredited herd list will be issued about January 1, and it will be interesting to note the increase in tested herds in the various states.

This is a co-operative movement for the control and eventual eradication of bovine tuberculosis. It is being carried on by the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture and state livestock commissions or state veterinarians. This movement was inaugurated in 1917 and Accredited Herd List No. 2 of the Bureau of Animal Industry, which is revised to April 1, 1919, has just come from the Public printer. This list shows the number of accredited herds—those that have successfully passed two annual or three semi-annual tests without a reactor or a suspect—for the whole country to be 782. Virginia heads the list with 196 herds, while Minnesota stands second with 131.

The Pacific Northwest is making a most creditable record in the present campaign, breeders generally being ready and willing to co-operate with federal and state officials in their efforts to stamp out bovine tuberculosis. During the month of September, 7195 cattle in 671 herds in Oregon and Washington were tested and only 138 reactors found. The campaign in these states is being carried on under the direction of Dr. Sam B. Foster, of Portland. Dr. Foster has charge of the Portland office of the Bureau of Animal Industry and has two veterinary assistants in Oregon and three in Washington. Dr. W. H. Lytle and Dr. E. F. Benson, state veterinarians of Oregon and Washington respectively, are co-operating in the work.
