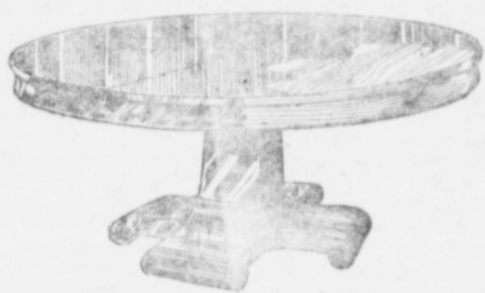

The Wolfhagen store building was a two-story structure, the upper floor being used for lodge and other meeting purposes. Wolfhagen estimates his loss on buildings and stock at \$10,000, with insurance of \$7500.

CLUB MEMBER ENJOYS TRIP TO STATE FAIR

I joined the Work-a-Way cooking club in March, 1919, at the Pleasant Valley school, District 15 joint. I completed my ten lessons during the summer months and then baked a loaf of bread and exhibited it at the Multnomah county fair at Gresham on September 15 and there I won second prize, my score being 94½ per cent. I was awarded a free trip to the state fair and 16 thrift stamps also.

There were three others from Multnomah county who won free trips to the state fair by their excellent work.

I then made ready for the trip. I took the train for Salem at 5 o'clock Tuesday, September 23 and arrived there about 7:30. I was met at the train by Miss Calkins, our county club leader, and was taken from there to the boys' and girls' club camp in the fair grounds, where I was given my supper.

After the meal was over I was taken by one of the matrons to the girls' sleeping tent and given a cot where I made my bed and took ease for the night. We girls rose early, made our beds and got ready for breakfast.

The club camp was situated in one corner of the fair grounds. There was a sleeping tent for the girls and matrons, and one for the boys, each provided with cots. The eating tent was nearby where we were served excellent food.

There were three matrons who looked after the girls and took them to the horse show, on their trips to the capitol and watched after us in every way.

There were boys and girls from every county in the state who had won trips to the fair.

After breakfast we were allowed to go out in the grounds and enjoy the rest of the day, only we had to come in and get our meals if we wanted any, and of course, most of the boys and girls did.

The first day I went to see the grounds which were beautiful, and through some of the large buildings. The entrance was a walk shaded by trees. In the center of the grounds were some beautiful flowers surrounded by a walk. There were flowers around the buildings also.

They had a special building for fancy work. In one building there were booths for the deaf and dumb, where they displayed their exhibits of sewing, fancy work, cooking and vegetable raising.

The industrial exhibits of the

club children from all the counties were very nice. Many of the counties of Oregon had their exhibits of grain, fruit and vegetables. In the evening we went to a horse show where they played a game with men on horses. There were other animals on parade while the music was playing.

The next morning we went to the capitol building in Salem. We went through the capitol building and the supreme court, and then to the penitentiary and state hospital. The courthouse and postoffice with their beautiful grounds were also visited.

We came back and spent the rest of the day on the fair grounds. We went around and saw the sheep, cattle, pigs, goats and horses, also the poultry. They had some fine stock and poultry.

Each evening the boys and girls entertained some prominent men. Thursday evening we entertained Governor Olcott at supper and he made us a speech.

Of course there had to be a merry-go-round, airships, the whips, Ferris wheels and other amusements.

The next day I went around and looked at all the amusements, races and other things that might be seen. That night I went to bed thinking of what a good time I had had, and that I must leave in the morning. I left on the 9:45 Oregon Electric, and arrived in Portland at the Jefferson Street depot about 11:50.
