Today and for years to come the American Red Cross stands ready to be your friend and counselor. You men who are fighting to overcome the handicaps the result of the war will find in every community a Red Cross committee anxious to be of service to you in any way.

This message is a promise—a promise from that mother of all soldiers—the American Red Cross.
