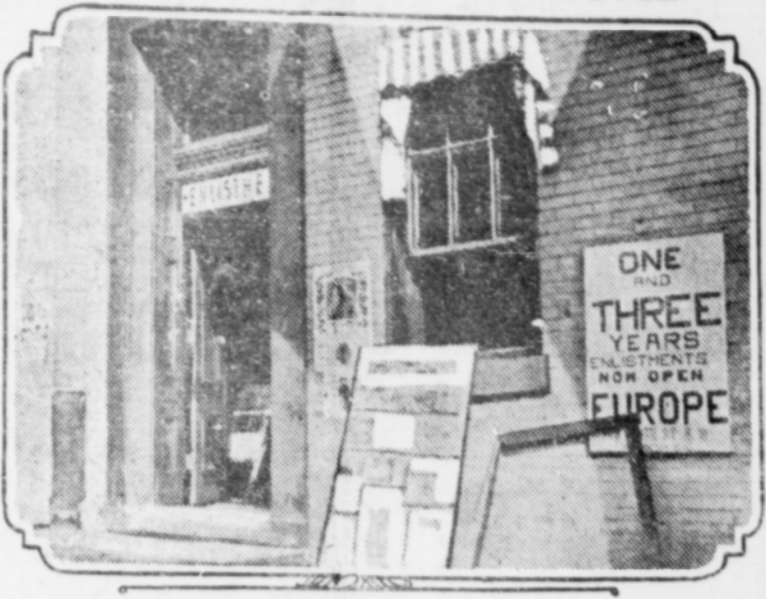

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction is insisting upon a revised geography for our public schools. The one now in use, Tarr and McMurry's, contains considerable German propaganda.

Especially offensive, according to Mr. Churchill, is that part of the descriptive matter which compares Germany's advantages and resources with those of England and other allied countries.
