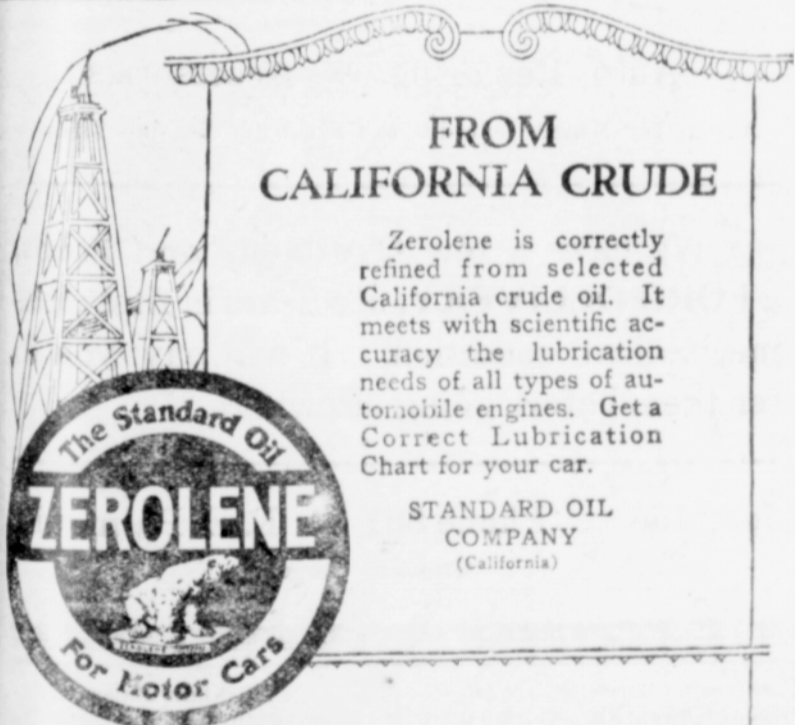

Pigs Like Balanced Rations.

An important factor in balancing pigs' rations, and one given too little consideration, is crude fiber, which should not exceed 5.5 per cent of the ration, says a new bulletin on finishing pigs for market, just issued by the O. A. C. experiment station. Commercial hog feeds advertised as carrying desirable percentages of protein and carbohydrates are worth but little if the crude fiber content runs too high. Alfalfa hay contains 28 per cent crude fiber, and to give necessary amount of nutrients would require the animal to eat 15 to 20 pounds a day—a physical impossibility. Hence it is not possible to fatten hogs on alfalfa hay. The most economical main and supplemental feeds for balancing the rations are listed with their respective ratios for best results. GOODWIN OUTLINES NEW SCHOOL PLAN

Continued from page 1

I. Suggested Powers and Duties of the County Boards of Education.

1. To enforce the laws relative to education and the rules and regulations of the State Board of Education within their respective counties.

2. To elect the county school superintendent and all necessary supervisory and office assistants; also other employees necessary to carry on the school work of the county most successfully and economically.

3. To have direct charge of all county schools outside of incorporated towns employing a city school superintendent and first class districts, including the closing of unnecessary schools, building new schools, consolidating schools, and conveying children to and from school, and organizing rural high and vocational schools.

4. To elect all teachers and principals needed in the county schools, on nomination of the county school superintendent, fix their salaries and the salaries of all other employees.

5. To levy a uniform school tax on the taxable property of the county under legal limitations; and to expend the funds thus procured to equalize educational advantages among all school children of the county.

6. To supply the necessary equipment for the schools of the county.

7. To enforce the compulsory attendance laws of the state.

8. To fix the course of study for elementary and high schools in conformity with the State Course of Study for such schools, and adopt text books in conformity with state adoption by State Text Book Commission.

II. Suggested Powers and Duties of the County Superintendent:

1. To act as executive officer of the county board of education and to administer, under its direction, the educational policies determined upon by the board.

2. To act as chief educational officer of the county, in which capacity he should represent the county board of education.

3. To see that the compulsory-attendance laws are enforced and child-welfare laws obeyed.

4. To nominate for appointment or election by the county board of education, all principals, teachers and professional supervisors needed for proper administration of the schools of the county under his supervision.

5. To supervise the class-room practice of all the county schools, either in person or through his assistants.

6. To carry out all policies of the county board and have charge under direction of the board, of all schools, including continuation school activities, night schools, part-time schools, short courses, and all other types of education undertaken for the promotion of vocational education and other education within the county.

7. To have charge of the health education in the county, and physical training work as prescribed by state law.

8. To keep full records of all educational activities within the county and to make reports from time to time to the county board of education, and to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

III. Suggested Powers and Duties of District Boards of Education.

1. To act as custodian of the local school property.

2. To make suggestions to the county board of education for improvement of the local school.

3. To promote closer cooperation between the school and the home, between parents and teachers; to aim to improve the school equipment; to secure more adequate support and better housing conditions for teachers; to endeavor to provide ways and means that may be necessary to enable all children to remain in school until they have finished the grammar grades.

4. To arrange for public meetings at such times as they may decide for the free and orderly discussion of all questions which concern the social, moral, political and economic welfare of the community.

5. To visit the schools from time to time, assist teachers in maintaining discipline, and when necessary may exclude refractory pupils therefrom subject to further action by the county board of education.
