OLD RESIDENT DIES
AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Lorenz Walch, for about thirty years a resident of the Hillside neighborhood on the Damascus road, died on Friday, November 28, after an illness of a week, the cause being hardening of the arteries. He is survived by three sons, Joseph, Herman and August, and a daughter, Pauline, all of the family home.

Mr. Walch was born in the Austrian Alps on December 23, 1856. He came to Portland, where he married Miss Mary Francis, and they came at once to the farm which was their home since then, where their six children were born and where the mother passed away twelve years ago. One little daughter died several years ago, and one son, William, paid the supreme sacrifice in the Argonne in October, 1918, fighting for his country. Joseph and Herman also served in the American army.

The funeral services were held yesterday at the Catholic church in Gresham and the body was laid to rest in St. Joseph's cemetery.
