## ACTIVITIES OF Y. M. C. A. IN ARMY OF OCCUPATION

Marked expansion has taken place in Coblenz, Germany, in providing for leisure time of members of the Army of Occupation and the newly-arrived Silesian troops. Liberty Hut has been converted into a big gymnasium, and the Festhalle has been taken over by the Red Triangle.

The equipment of the Festhalle includes eight pool and billiard tables and three bowling alleys. Needless to say, these are busy from early morning until closing time at night. The old Festhalle restaurant has been remodeled into a cafeteria, a new stage has been built in the main auditorium, and a new movie booth has been installed with two machines. In the main auditorium movies are given afternoon and evening. In addition to these, there are game rooms, writing and reading rooms, and information desk and mailing booth.

The 5th and 59th Infantry Regiments, which arrived during the month, were destined for Silesian service, but were held here for a time. They were stationed at Andernach, Mayen, Oehndung, Thur Plaidt, Niedermendig and Kruff. Previous to their arrival, there had been requisitions in each of these towns buildings for the "Y." In these huts movie machines had been installed, supplies and equipment delivered and the personnel of the "Y" workers was on the ground.

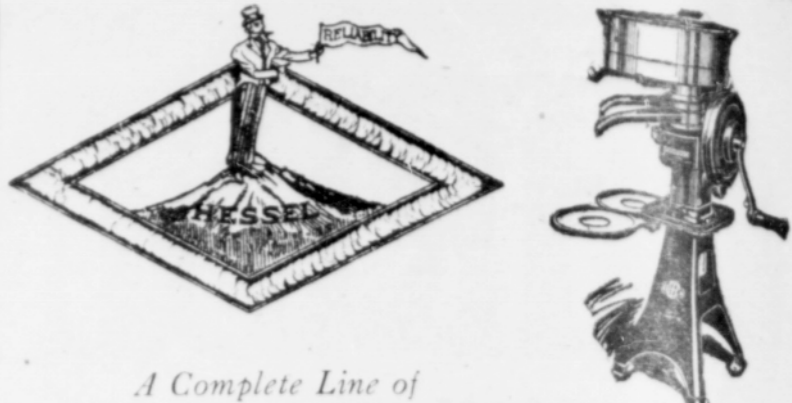

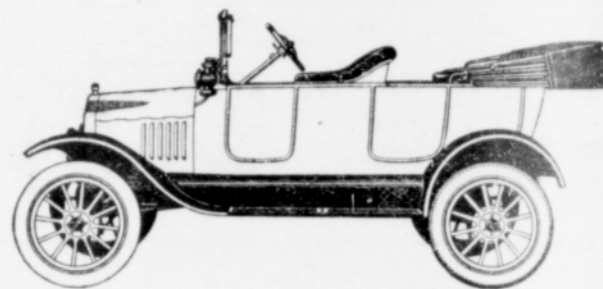

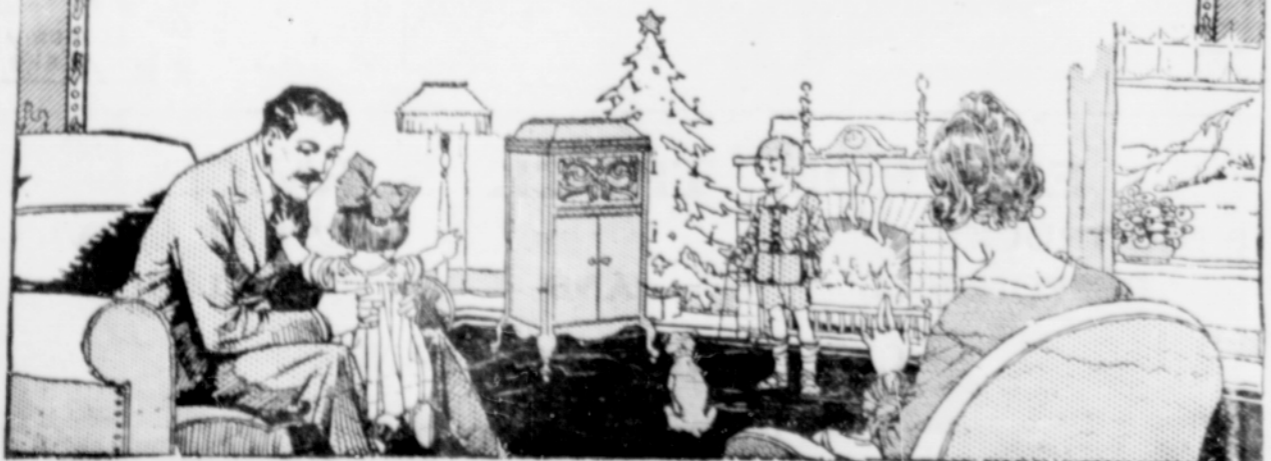
