Home Co-operative Industry.

Growing small fruits like loganberries, blackberries, raspberries, strawberries and cherries is essentially a home and family industry.

It does not require skilled or imported labor to handle the crop and gives employment to the surplus home and family labor.

The manufacturer of the products in canneries, jam and jelly plants and dehydrated plants and juice factories takes more home labor.

These crops are essentially co-operative industries, where the products are grown from a city lot to ten acres and sold to the factory.

The near-by market for all these perishable products is practically the only market and that unites the industry and the grower.

So-called pools to ship small fruit long distances must prove failures in the exigencies of trade and the ups and downs of the market.

The steady and reliable home market must be maintained with a fair price for the grower and fair price for the manufacturer.

There is no danger of glutting the market with small fruits and the co-operative principle between grower and producer must obtain.

The thing for every commercial organization and community to reach out for is as large an acreage as possible and increases production.

That means more canneries and more fruit products plants built at centers most convenient for the growers to have a home market.

Work and earn. Make a budget. Keep a record of expenditures. Have a bank account. Carry life insurance. Make a will. Own your own home. Pay your bills promptly. Invest in government securities. Share with others.
