AMERICAN LEGION WILL BE EXEMPLARY

The following items were sent out by the state headquarters of the American Legion, located in Portland, Oregon, and on account of there being a post here are considered of greater interest than otherwise. The American Legion all over the United States is taking an active part in public affairs and while not a political organization is fast becoming a moulder of opinion by its stand on the many questions arising.

The statement is expressly made that the American Legion has no intention of taking the law into its own hands in its war against unlawful acts.

Their position is clearly set forth in the words of the national commander, Franklin D'Olier as follows:

"We must always clearly bear in mind that any disposition on the part of individual members of the Legion or of local posts to take law into their own hands, to regulate by force or demonstration of forceful intent what is contrary to our interpretation of one hundred per cent Americanism, or to act as self-constituted vigilantes, or to act as self-constituted vigilantes in disregard of lawful and properly constituted authority, is not only subversive of the principles and ideals of the American Legion, but will weaken and tend to destroy our influence for good in this country."

"In our efforts to assist in the maintenance of law and order, the American Legion must, itself, set an example of lawful and orderly action. The American Legion has become so strong that we need fear no force from without—but let us be sure that no overzealous, or thoughtless, or unfair act of our own occur to weaken our influence for national betterment or alienate the support of true Americans."

In a letter recently sent William Howard Taft, in reply to an editorial written by him, interpreting the spirit and purposes of The American Legion, the national commander pointed out a threefold purpose by the great body of ex-service men now enrolled in the Legion.

First: He said, mutual helpfulness whereby all our comrades who have been handicapped in mind, body and position, through service to their country may receive that liberal consideration which we have reason to expect from a grateful and patriotic nation.

Second: Protection for our country from foes without, including a truly democratic; a truly American military policy.

Third: Protection for our country from foes within. He concludes:

"Although the American Legion represents nearly five million American citizens who have demonstrated their patriotism and loyalty by willingness to make the supreme sacrifice, we also realize that the strength of the Legion and the measure of our influence and service to the nation will be in direct proportion to our ability to cooperate effectively with the one hundred million loyal and patriotic American citizens in the promotion of 100 per cent Americanism."

The national body of the American Legion is planning an Americanization commission which has as its object, "to endeavor to realize in the United States the basic ideal of the American Legion of 100 per cent Americanism through the planning, establishment and conduct of a continuous constructive educational system. This system is designed to:

- 1 Combat all anti-American tendencies, activities and propaganda.
- 2 Work for the education of immigrants, prospective American citizens and alien residents in the principles of Americanism.
- 3 Inculcate the ideas of Americanism in the citizen population.
- 4 Spread throughout the people of the nation information as to the real nature and principles of American government.
- 5 Foster the teaching of Americanism in all schools.

Mr. Arthur Woods, former police commissioner of New York City has been named chairman of this commission.
