"Well," said the reluctant and loving brother, "if you must have it, he said it was unearthly."—The Classmate.

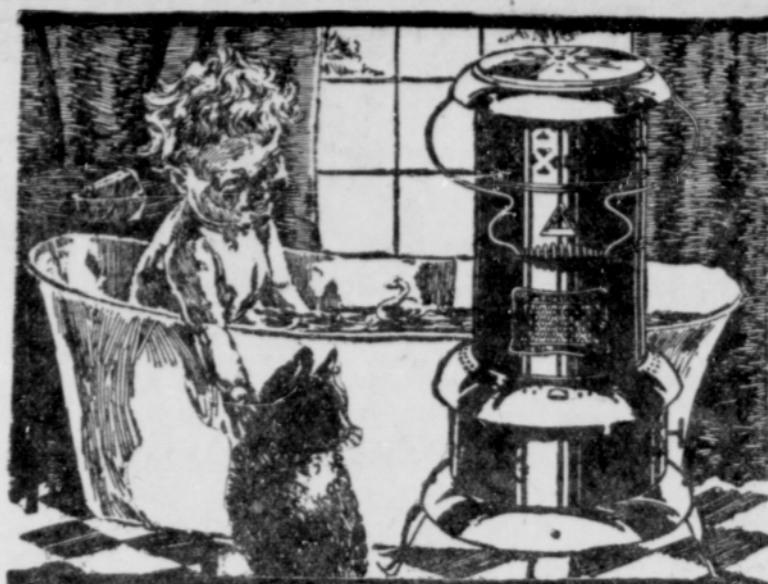
