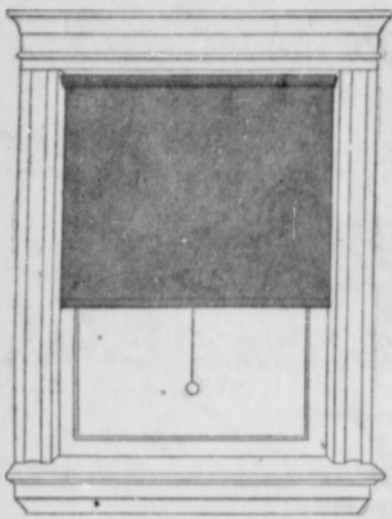

## 75% CUTHBERT BERRIES GROWN IN MULTNOMAH

April this should be plowed under to add fertility and fiber to the soil. It also aids in holding the moisture. Cultivate promptly after every rain as soon as the soil is dry enough to work.

The use of the hand hoe is very important for the first two years in starting raspberries after that the berries shade the soil and choke out the weeds and one hoeing a year will control them if it is done early. The average man should hoe one acre per day. The cost of cultivating and hoeing is much less and of much benefit if done when the weeds are small.

The best main crop raspberry is the Cuthbert. It is a heavy yielder of large, firm, sweet berries that have a beautiful color which is held after canning. This makes the fruit very attractive and the flavor is delicious.

A good average crop of Cuthbert

berries in this locality on land that is suited for their production is two tons per acre. Yields of four tons are known and three tons are averaged by our best growers. A lot depends on the man. One cannot hope to get good yields of berries and neglect to cultivate and give the proper care to the vines. In berry season the auto must rest while the weeds are killed.

A field of Cuthbert berries once started is estimated to be good for 25 years. The oldest field of raspberries the writer knows of in this locality is owned by H. G. Harman, who lives about four miles west of Gresham on the Powell Valley road. These berries are 15 years old and are still good producers.

Address: "The part the W. C. T. U. had in the evolution of the temperance reform." Mrs. M. Sleeth, state president.

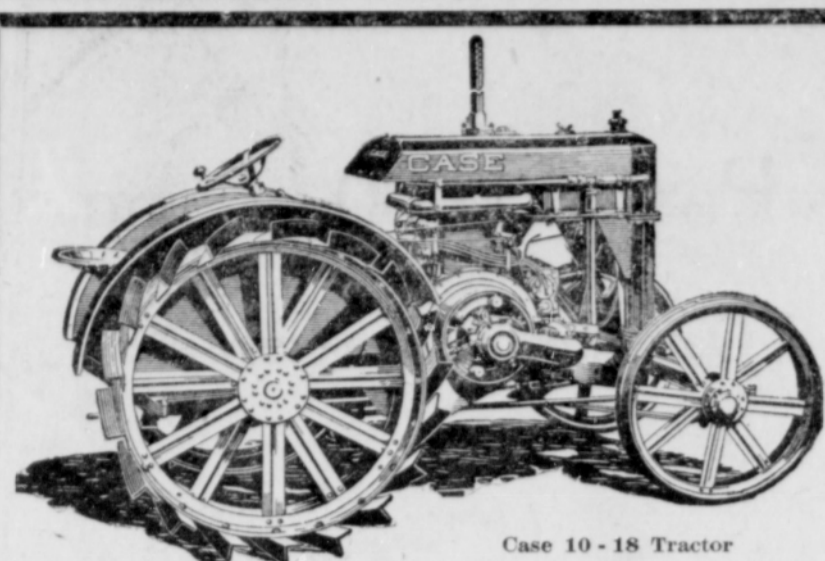
