Katherine Metzger and Ise Schwedler took part in the program held at Lynch school last Thursday evening.

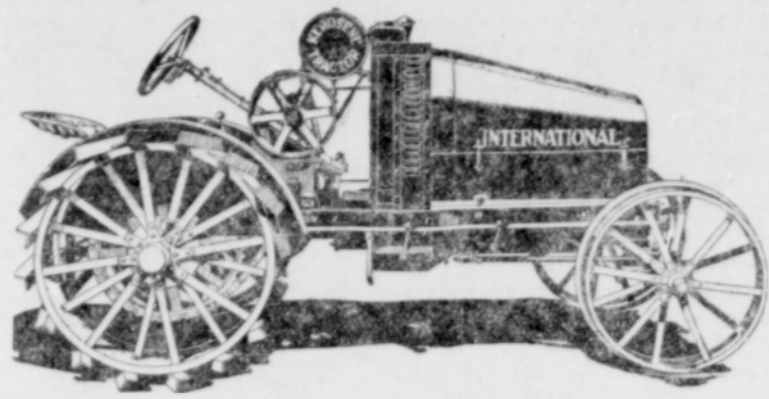

Does Crooked Breastbone Injure Poultry?

Gresham, Oregon, Feb. 2, 1920.—Editor Gresham Outlook.—Please let me know through your paper if roosters with crooked breastbones are good for breeding purposes. I was told not, and I would greatly appreciate it if you would let me know what effect it would have on the chicks.

BEGINNER IN POULTRY RAISING.

Answer: Mark Nickerson, a prominent poultryman says that it depends on the cause of the deformity.

"Any fowls if put on a narrow roost when young, will develop a crooked breastbone," says Mr. Nickerson, "and if this is the cause it would have no effect on the value of the bird for breeding purposes. If, however, the deformity is caused by some inherent weakness it would not be suitable for breeding purposes."

H. W. Cooley says that "careful breeders do not use for breeding purposes a cock with a crooked breastbone."

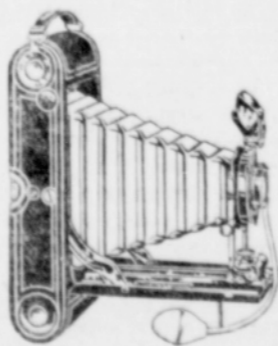
