Lincoln Day Memorial Banquet.

The Lincoln day memorial dinner given last night in the old Chamber of Commerce building, Portland, was a notable event, attended by about 600 republicans, among them a fair representation of ladies. It was given under auspices of the state and county republican central committees and associated clubs. Gresham was represented by Milo C. King and H. L. St. Clair.

The three most noteworthy items on the program were the invocation by Rev. C. E. Cline, the principal address by Chaplain (Mayor) William S. Gilbert and a characteristic address by Mrs. Elizabeth B. Hanley.

Dr. Cline, well known here, a veteran of the civil war, offered the invocation which was particularly impressive and appropriate. The large company stood in reverent spirit while this admirer of the immortal Lincoln led their thoughts in gratitude to the evidences of a divine leading through the crisis of the past and breathed a profound prayer for guidance of this nation in the future.

Chaplain Gilbert said that the present time called for the spirit of Lincoln. We need, said he, the optimism of the great president. Describing the zero hour for the soldiers in the trenches, he declared that America is approaching the zero hour in her history and soon American must act. His address was timely and impressive and was made vivid by illustrations from the life and sayings of Lincoln and incidents gathered from his own observations and experiences as chaplain of the second Oregon in the World War.

SALVATION ARMY HOME SERVICE PROGRAM

The success with which the plan, embraced in the Army's 1920 "Home Service Program" has been received everywhere indicates general concurrence in the belief that it offers a solution of the problem of effecting expeditious and efficient social service in many sections of the state where the population is somewhat scattered and there are few or no Salvation Army corps. In one county having more than a hundred cases of influenza it was learned no nurses were available while another was discovered to be totally lacking in charitable organizations.

Through the advisory boards the Army hopes to establish much closer relations with the outlying sections in order to concentrate its relief forces wherever they may be most needed. Each board will study and report on the situation in its county, the reports to be confidential and used only in determining the action of the Salvation Army.
