Tuesday afternoon about 20 adults and the Gresham and Lynch stock judging teams of club boys went on a stock judging trip to J. Luscher's farm near Fairview where the party inspected the barns and stock. The party was under the direction of Prof. E. L. Westover.

The famous sire of Mr. Luscher's herd was brought out and also the valuable 14 year old cow which is the first pure bred cow owned by Mr. Luscher. After an inspection of these animals, five of their daughters were brought out and the benefits of good breeding were demonstrated.

Mr. Westover explained the points of a good cow and then four milk cows were brought out and the boys from the Gresham and Lynch stock judging teams placed the cows showing by their manner that they had a knowledge of the business. The men then placed the cows and later the ladies were asked to judge the cows and place them. A few did and Miss

Ethel I. Calkins was congratulated when it was learned that she had correctly placed them.

Grant McMillan scored the highest among the boys and he stepped out and explained his placement and the different points he had judged, like a veteran. One of the men said, "Well, the youngster surely knows his business." A. Brugger also explained the different points and the party disbanded owing to the lateness of the hour. It had been planned to visit Mr. Brugger's farm also. Everyone felt it had been a very profitable afternoon.

Mr. Brewster offered a sitting of White Rock eggs to the club member who would promise to exhibit at the fair next fall. Harry Hollywood accepted and made arrangements to buy two other sittings from Mr. Brewster as he wants to have three sittings to select from.

Mr. Brewster has promised to come back about September 1st and instruct the children on making up their exhibits for the fair. He will also train a judging team from the Gresham Poultry club and prepare them to judge at the next western poultry show to be held next winter in Portland.

Club work is making good progress in Cedar school. A standard cooking club has been organized with Mrs. A. C. Althouse as leader. A club of sewing is being organized also.

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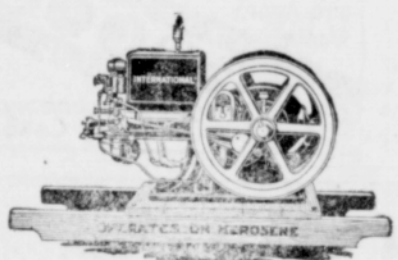
