Miss Calkins and Mrs. Felt visited the Lusted school last Wednesday.

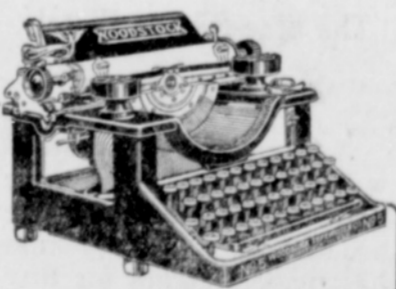
**FAIRVIEW**
