ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR COUNTY MEETING

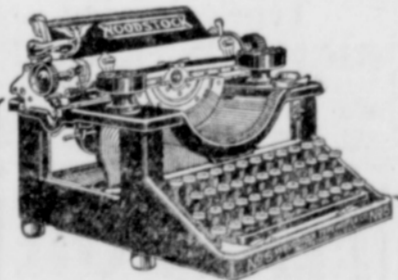
As a result of arrangements completed at the state Pastors' Conference held in Portland last week under the direction of the Interchurch World Movement, the conference to be held in Multnomah county has been tentatively assigned to one day and evening between April 6 and April 15. This conference greatly will follow in form the state pastors' meeting in Portland. A "team" of widely-known pastors and other church leaders will have the program in charge and most of the addresses will be accompanied by stereopticon slides and large size charts.

These county conferences, one to be held in each county in Oregon, mark the opening of the campaign in this state to raise its share of the budget for 1920 set by the 30 denominations co-operating in the Interchurch World Movement and amounting to \$336,777,527, of which \$175,448,349 is to be paid this year. This sum comprises all the askings of the cooperative denominations and while it is the largest single project of the kind ever authorized in this country it has the distinct advantage of being the only one based on exactly accurate estimates with a set objective for every dollar asked. These objectives will not be changed in any detail. County representatives now are being appointed for the various departments of the Interchurch World Movement and to care for the financial campaign which soon is to be put under way. These appointments will be announced within the next two weeks.

NATURALIZATION IS URGED BY LEGION

A nation-wide campaign looking to the naturalization of the thousands of ex-service men of foreign birth has been inaugurated by the American Legion, Franklin D'Olivier, National Commander, having today sent the following instructions to State Department Commanders, who in turn will transmit them in substance to the eight thousand Posts of the organization scattered throughout the country.

"Above everything else, the American Legion and American Legion members stand for 100 per cent Americanism. Legion members are men who have fought to defend American Ideals. Upon re-entering civilian life they are most anxious to see these ideals preserved. To this end, every effort should be made to see that all Legion members enjoy the rights and privileges and appreciate the duties of American citizenship.

"The law provides that any man who served honorably in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps during the war, who was not a citizen when he entered the service, may become naturalized upon presentation of his petition for naturalization without making the preliminary declaration of intention, without proof of five years' residence within the United States and without payment of the customary fees."

Under the provisions of this law, many men were naturalized while at the training camps, and have already received their citizenship papers. However, there are still many eligible to immediate citizenship who have not as yet received their papers, and a special effort should be made to reach these men and see that they take advantage of their opportunity. This work is a service not only to the man himself but is also a service in the interests of 100 per cent Americanism.

Plans for Service.

Prominent men all over the state are endorsing the Salvation Army Home Service Program of 1920. They express gratification because of the organization of an efficient working force which will carry the work of the army to every part of Oregon, to the smallest outpost, as well as in the towns and cities of the state. County advisory boards are being organized in every county in the state, and these boards includes the best elements of every community. These advisory boards will study the conditions in their various counties and report to headquarters. It is the plan of the Salvation Army to base its service entirely upon the desires of the people, as expressed through their county advisory boards.

Very few people realize the wide field which the Salvation Army covers, although every one recognizes the value of the work they do.

There are sixteen major activities into which the work of the Salvation Army is divided. Every one is familiar with the Evangelistic Work of the Army, also the Christmas dinners which are furnished to poor families during the holiday season. City folks, especially poor mothers and babies, know of the fresh air camps where they may spend a short summer vacation.

Free employment bureaus are at the service of those who are unskilled in any line of work. Locating missing friends and relatives is an important part of the Army's work.

Much work is carried on in the prisons for the prisoner and for the families of the men. Young Women's Boarding homes are established in large cities where girls who labor for a modest salary may board at a very low cost.

Homes for orphaned children, rescue homes for the reclamation of fallen girls, maternity hospitals, and industrial homes for homeless men where they are given temporary work until permanent employment is found

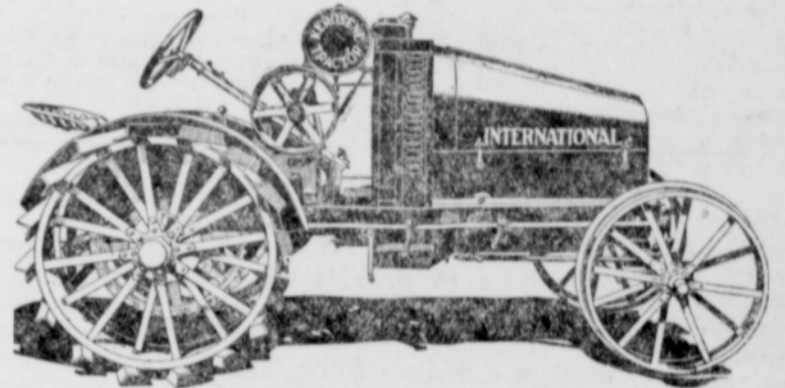
