ENVELOPE FIGURES IN INTERESTING CASE

McGuirk & Schneider handled an interesting case recently for Mrs. S. L. Gregson of Boring. Mrs. Gregson had applied to the Industrial Accident Commission for compensation but her claim was refused on the grounds that the injuries which caused her husband's death were not incurred during the course of employment. Friends and the physician urged Mrs. Gregson to appeal the case which she did after some delay. By that time only 36 hours were left of the 30 days allowed for an appeal. But the papers were drawn up and the appeal filed before the time expired.

An interesting point in the case was that the notice from the commission was dated almost two weeks before it was received here, but the envelope showed that the letter wasn't mailed until two days before she received it. But for the envelope the case would have been lost for the law allows only 30 days for an appeal. She was first told that there was no chance for a case because the time limit had passed, then it was noticed that the letter had been delayed in mailing and it was found that she was still in a position to appeal.

The commission made a new investigation and just before the suit was brought to trial an adjustment was made whereby the plaintiff gets the full compensation allowed by the state for herself and children.

IDENTIFICATION CARD REPLACES DATING SLIP

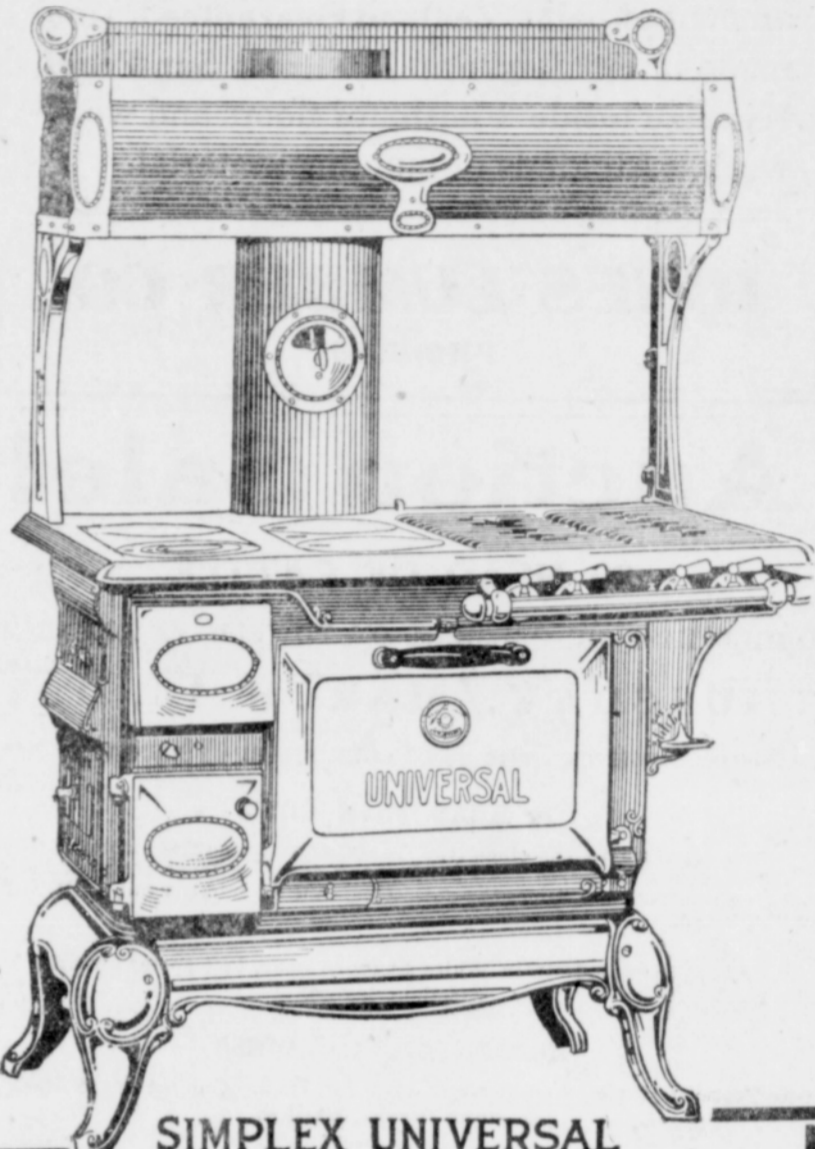
