CORBETT FARM BUREAU DOING ACTIVE WORK

The Farm Bureau meeting which was held at Corbett, Thursday, March 11, was a splendid meeting and everyone showed a great deal of interest.

A number of boys were present and a certified potato club was organized. All of the members will try to certify their potatoes this year. J. W. Evans, crop improvement committeeman, signed up 15 or 20 new growers for small acreage. About 40 acres more were added during the evening, to the amount of land which will be used to grow certified seed potatoes. The quota for the district has been set for 190 acres and the prospect is that they will go over the top.

The community committeemen elected a chairman, A. G. Salzman, who will represent them on the County Farm Bureau.

Already the committeemen have been busy and the work is progressing rapidly.

The chairman of the soil improvement committee has got in touch with all the farmers who are using super phosphate and have arranged for them to leave check plots so that they can check up on the increase and find out the value of this form of fertilizer. They have also received instructions as to how to use it.

The livestock committee has listed the names of the majority in that section who own grade bulls and an effort is being made to eliminate all grade bulls from the community.

The farm crops committee has arranged with a number of other growers who were not present Thursday night to grow certified seed and have also signed up a number who will grow certified grain. The prospect is good for 100 acres of grain, which is the quota set.

One more committeeman was added to the list. Roy Emily was elected chairman of the weed control project. The main problem of this community will be the control of the Canada thistle.

S. B. Hall discussed potato diseases and the effect that they have on the yield. This talk and the pictures which illustrated it were very helpful and much appreciated.

F. M. Lasley gave a short talk of his experience in growing and selling certified seed last year which was of great benefit to the new growers.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTS PARTIAL TEACHING FORCE

At a meeting of the Union High school board last Wednesday evening the matter of the election of faculty members for next year was taken up and a part of the list was disposed of. There are still others to be elected at a later meeting.

The board voted to re-elect Principal Elmer F. Goodwin, Miss Mary Good, Miss Lettie Gregson, Miss Grace Hartley, Miss May Morrison, Miss Minnie Schrepel, Miss Estelle Webb, Leslie E. Webb, Miss Adeline Wyeth and Tom G. Taylor.

The following resolutions were presented to the board by the junior class of the high school:

"Whereas, conditions at the Union High school are becoming critical on account of lack of classrooms and other conveniences to accommodate the large number of students now in attendance, and

"Whereas, it seems that at least 100 students will be denied admittance to this excellent school next year, including about 20 members of our class if students living outside the Union district are first shut out, and

"Whereas, our class which is composed of 60 boys and girls are anxious to complete the work together and graduate from Union High school in June, 1921, be it

"Resolved, that we, by petition, most respectfully ask your honorable body to take such steps immediately as may be necessary to provide accommodations for all of us next year, and our schoolmates and others, and be it further

"Resolved, that we as a class and as individuals pledge to you our support of any movement having in view the continued success and growth of Union High school, and be it further

"Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be furnished the *Munhnotu* and *Gresham Outlook* for publication."

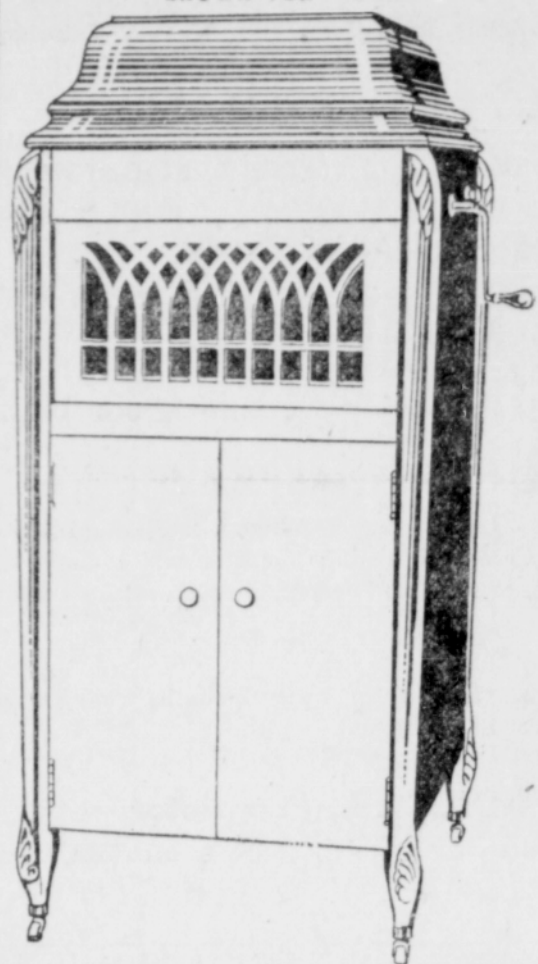
The annual rose festival will follow the Shrine, and because of there being so many eastern visitors in Portland the effort will be made to put on the finest show that the rose growers have ever staged.

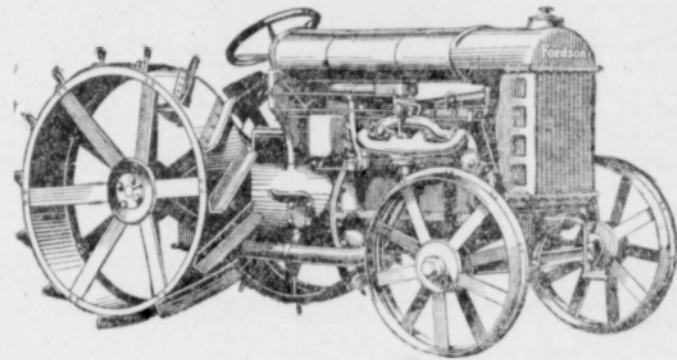
