Several prominent citizens of Gresham who are known to be in touch with local civic needs have received letters this week asking them to represent the University of Oregon in their locality.

Among those who have been requested to co-operate in this work are H. L. St. Clair, Dr. Geo. Inglis, Rev. H. Bruenagel, Mayor Geo. W. Kenney, the principals of the schools and teachers in the grades.

Former students of the Agricultural College, the State University, and the Normal School in this vicinity, have just received a booklet explaining the crisis at the three institutions. The booklet shows that the number of students at the Agricultural College has increased 148 per cent and at the University 152 per cent in seven years; but that the income from the state has increased less than four per cent.

The Agricultural College and the State University will have to close their doors to at least 1900 students, and perhaps to twice that number, unless relief is voted in the May election.

A Distinguished Family. OREGON AREA TO BE SURVEYED BY EXPERTS

While the work undertaken by the Interchurch World Movement of making a comprehensive survey of every county in the state of Oregon has not been nearly completed, it is far enough along so that many important and significant facts regarding this locality probably will be available for use at the conference to be held in this county early in April.

Specially trained men have in charge the making of the surveys which cover not only the city and town but also every rural district of the state. They show the increase or decrease in church membership; the memberships of various associated organizations such as missionary boards and young people's societies; the number of pastors in relation to the total population; and, not least, the salaries received by ministers in the state.

Only the exceptional county, it is said, will escape hearing some unpalatable facts as its survey is made public. In some places throughout the state it has been found that church attendance has declined from 10 to 30 per cent in the last decade. Many of these sections are rural and the automobile is given as one cause for the drop in attendance. It is said by surveyors that the loss to the rural church often has resulted in a gain for the city congregation as the automobile takes the former rural church attendants to town for the Sunday services. But again, it is shown, the automobile also takes persons who formerly attended church to the fishing streams of a Sunday.

The program of the county conference also will have time allotted to a report of the foreign surveys of the Interchurch World Movement, upon which budget estimates for increased missionary activities have been based. Then there will be a discussion of the coming simultaneous financial campaign in this county, and denominational meetings of the different churches associated with the Interchurch World Movement.
