I am in favor of encouraging agriculture and recognizing the principle that it is and must remain our most important industry.

Among the achievements credited to him as governor of Illinois are: A 33 per cent reduction in taxes and increased revenues, the establishment of a budget system, the application of business methods in the purchase of state supplies and the formulation of a comprehensive and economical road policy.

As a result of war injuries suffered by our forces overseas it is estimated that the number of major amputations (amputations of an arm or leg or both) was about 3,800. One of the functions of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance at Washington is to supply artificial limbs to those disabled in the service.

Artificial limbs of the peg type were used by the ancient Egyptians and the Romans. The first jointed artificial leg was invented in 1853 by Count de Beaufort, a French gallant, who found the awkwardly protruding peg leg a hindrance to polite drawing room intercourse.
