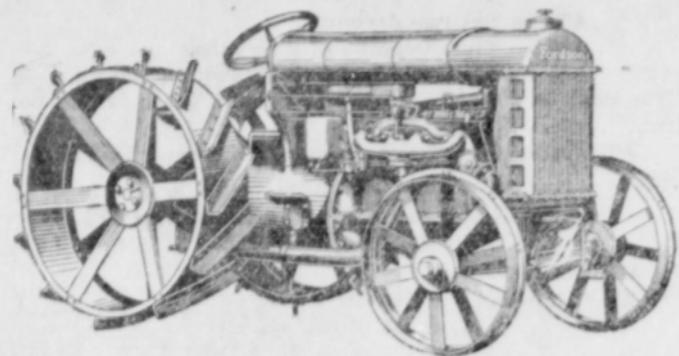

Voters, Attention!

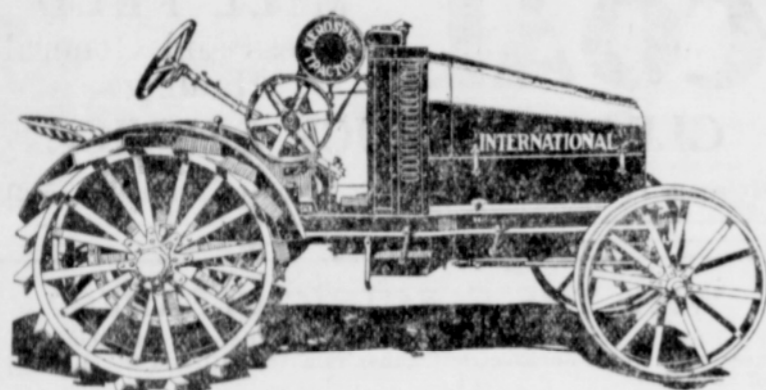
Although official notice was made in the Portland papers that all suburban offices at which voters could register were notified to close their registration books on April 12th. It has been found that the Gresham of-

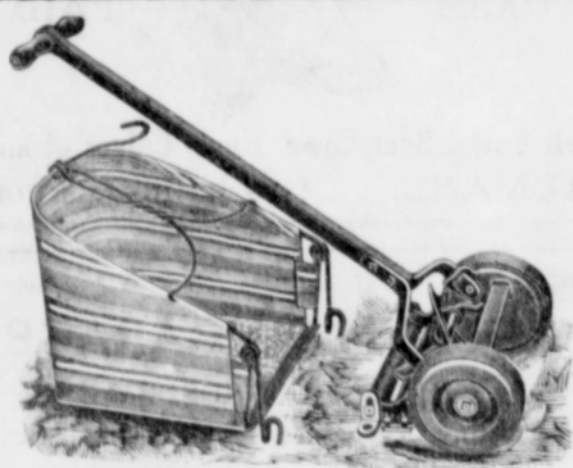

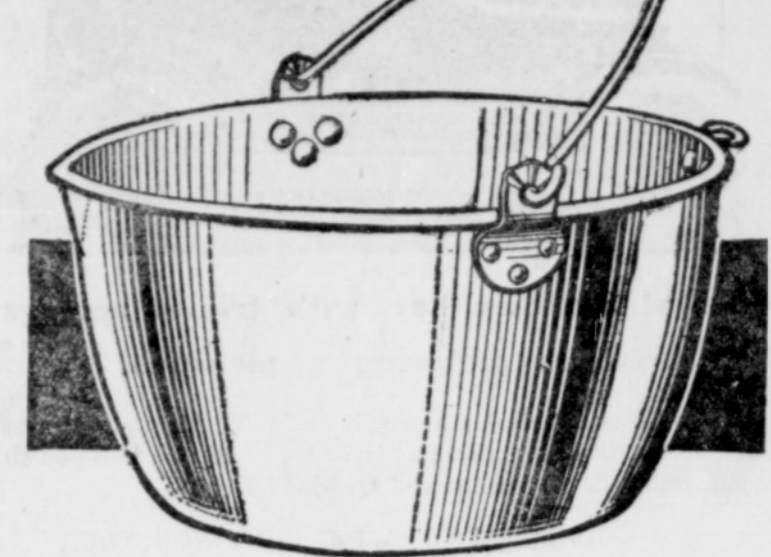

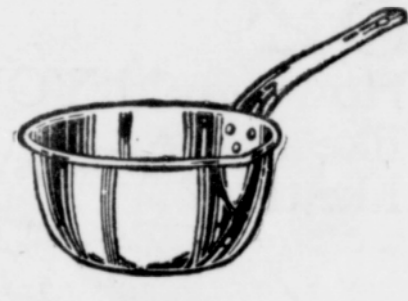
