presented by the last legislature for their approval.

"I feel that these measures present the finest opportunity for service for the Parent-Teachers associations that we have ever experienced," said Mrs. Hayhurst.

"Some definite ways in which you can assist," she continued, "are to see that every voter in your community is registered, which must be done very soon, before April 20, as registration for the primaries close next week.

"To my mind" continued Mrs. Hayhurst, "the most important bill is the Higher Educational tax measure. If

the 2-mill bill should fall the districts will have to make up the difference themselves which will work a hardship on many districts which are already paying from 15 to 30 mills school taxes to meet their school expenses, but if the high educational bill should fall there is no recourse but to close the doors of the colleges for the situation they face is desperate."

"Isn't Oregon going to do for her young people what all of her neighboring states are doing? Washington and California are doing more for their young people today than Oregon is for our and numbers of our young people are flocking to California and Washington universities every year to get courses that Oregon schools lack means to furnish. This is taking some of our finest young men and women" said Mrs. Hayhurst "and some of them will never come back here to live. Thus by not providing educational facilities adequate we are already losing a number of the finest young people and what will the condition be, if the schools have to close for lack of funds to carry on the work they are already doing?"

Mrs. Hayhurst also spoke of the need of each locality looking out for a suitable place for the teachers to board. "There is nothing which will react on your child's happiness like the living conditions of the teachers" she said.

M. to 7 P. M. on May 21, 1920 for the holding of said election.
