LOWDEN AND PROHIBITION.

Governor Lowden of Illinois is the only presidential candidate so far whom the Anti-Saloon League of America has approved as suitable to the prohibitionists.

Senator Warren G. Harding's prohibition record is reviewed at considerable length, but no definite statement as to his acceptability is made.

Senator Harding of Ohio usually votes with the drys, but always talks for the wets.

Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California, the statement says, "is being solidly supported by the liquor interests of California, not because of any particular service he has rendered them, but because he seems to command the support of the discontented and the liquor people just at this time are very much discontented."

Commenting on Governor Lowden, the statement says he was opposed for election as governor by many of the prohibitionists of Illinois, "but since his election as governor he has been so eminently fair and friendly to the prohibition laws and their enforcement that prohibitionists can support him if he is nominated."

The statement reiterates the position of the league as regards Governor James M. Cox of Ohio and Governor Edwards of New Jersey as announced some time ago by declaring that Governor Cox is "thoroughly wet" and that Governor Edwards is not really a candidate, but simply running as a side partner to Governor Cox in the hope of accumulating some strength that may be turned over to Cox at an opportune time.

AID FOR ADULT BLIND.

"Give the blind of Oregon an opportunity to be self-supporting" is the plea of the committee working in behalf of approval of the legislative bill to be voted on at the state election May 21st providing for a tax levy of one sixth of a mill to erect and equip an industrial and employment institution in the state of Oregon for the benefit of Oregon's blind.

"A great number of the blind of Oregon," says Oscar W. Horne, secretary of the citizens' committee, "are now almost wholly dependent upon charity. With the problem increased by the return of soldiers who have been rendered sightless, the majority of states have awakened to the duty of providing some means whereby the blind can be taught useful trades and become self-supporting."

"The voters are asked to give but a trifling amount and no one should hesitate in voting favorably on this bill. Campaign funds are not available and a committee interested in aiding the blind is seeking cooperation of all organizations in presenting the merits of the bill to the public. Endorsements are being received from all over the state."

The bill will be before the voters at the primary election May 21, having been referred to the voters by the Legislature. It provides for one sixth of a mill for establishing and equipping the institution and an annual levy of one twenty-fifth of a mill for maintenance.

Prohibition is likely to be considered successful as long as the wives of the land don't change their minds on the subject.

NOTICE OF ELECTION TO CHANGE BOUNDARIES

Notice is hereby given that petitions have been presented to the Common Council of the Town of Gresham, Multnomah County, Oregon, requesting the boundaries of the said Town of Gresham be changed so as to include new and additional territory within such boundaries as follows, to-wit:

The West half (1/2) of the Northeast quarter (1/4) of section fifteen (15), Township One (1) South, Range Three (3) East, of the Willamette Meridian, save and except the following bounded and described tract of land containing one acre beginning at the Southeast corner of above described land, running thence North along the East line thereof sixteen (16) rods; thence West ten (10) rods; thence south sixteen (16) rods; thence east ten (10) rods to the place of beginning, also,

Beginning at a point in the center of the Section Line Road and the West boundary of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C. thence West tracing the said center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C. to the West line of Minnie S. Clanaahs seven and one-half Acre tract of land; thence South crossing the Section Line Road to the South line of C. R. Miller's twenty acre tract of land; thence East to the West boundary line of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the place of beginning, containing twenty-four acres more or less.

And as said petitions were signed by the owners of said described land and more than one-fifth of the legal voters of the Town of Gresham as shown by the vote cast at the last Municipal election held therein, the said Council of the Town of Gresham has ordered that an election be held at which the proposition proposed by said petition shall be submitted to the legal voters of the Town of Gresham and of Territory to be annexed.

That said election be called to be held in the Town of Gresham on the 21st day of May, 1920. That at the said election the legal voters of the Town of Gresham and of the territory to be annexed are requested to attend and vote on said proposition of increasing and changing the boundary limits of the Town of Gresham so as to include the new and additional territory as hereinbefore specifically set out and said voters are requested to express themselves on said proposition by placing on their ballot at said special election the words "for annexation" or "against annexation" or other equivalent words expressing their preference; that the polling places fixed for the holding of such election will be at the regular polling places for the State Primary election in precincts 308, 309, and 309 1/2 and that the polls will be from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. on May 21, 1920 for the holding of said election.
