

Overland Car Tested to Find Gasoline Mileage.

Will Hessel, of the Overland company has called attention to the gasoline test which was made in Portland recently when H. H. Eling, Portland manager of the Overland company, made a test.

Frank Deyo, service superintendent at the Overland branch, drove the car on the run and outside of being in good condition, the car, a model four, sedan, was not especially prepared to make the test. A special tank was made to hold the gasoline and all the gasoline in the car was drawn out and two quarts put in the special container. Two additional quarts certified measure was taken along and the car started

out for Fairview on the Sandy road. The first two quarts run out at Fairview, 12.3 miles from starting point; the second two quarts were put in the tank and they then came to Gresham on the gravel cross road and back to Portland on the Section line road.

The car stopped at Ladd tract just off Division street at a distance of 25.4 miles for the one gallon of gas.

This test was made for the engineering department of the factory and was made a real test under the ordinary up and down roads of this part of the country.

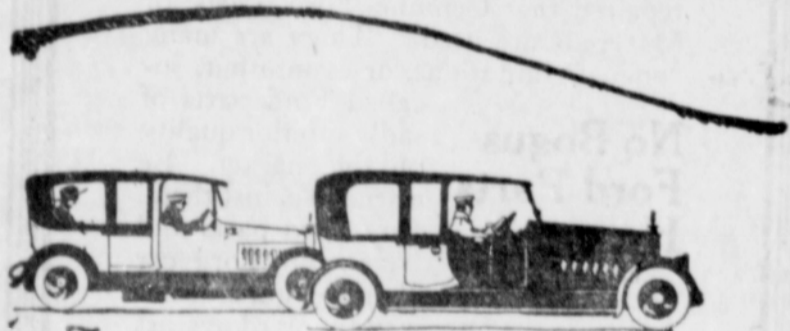

SALVATION ARMY TO MAKE BOYS FARMERS

Neglected Youngsters to Be Given Thorough Training in Mechanics of Farming.

With thorough appreciation of the value to the state of trained agriculturists, versed in modern methods and with a knowledge of applied mechanics necessary to modern farming, the Salvation Army in its Home Service Program for Oregon, plans to make useful farm hands, if not farm experts, of many neglected and dependent youngsters. Throughout the state there are always lads whose ages range from seven and eight to fifteen years, who will have no future apart from poverty and comparative ignorance and probable criminality. Opportunities such as those to be offered by the Industrial and Agricultural school the Salvation Army plans to establish at North Yamhill, on the 100 acre farm on which now stand the buildings of the Bishop Scott school, will open before these lads a useful life.

Brought up to manhood in clean surroundings, with daily instruction in ordinary schooling and practical instruction and practice in farming, the youngsters will not only be saved from bad citizenship but given an honorable profession or trade with which to earn their own way as men.

At the Yamhill school, to be patterned after the famous Lytton school conducted by the Salvation Army in California, both boys and girls will find all the essentials of preparation for life's battle. The girls will be taught sewing, household duties, cooking etc. The boys will be trained in several trades and in farming, horticultural and animal husbandry pursuits and modern farm mechanics.

And while their bodies and minds are being trained their responsibilities as citizens and members of society will not be neglected in fact, one of the strongest teachings of the Salvation Army is Americanism. The school is non-sectarian.

Through the efforts of the Salvation Army in Portland, several boys have been taken from up state Oregon towns and placed at the California farm school temporarily until the funds made available by the financial campaign, May 1 to May 10, provide for the opening of the Yamhill school. County advisory boards in every county in Oregon are helping the Salvation Army in this great work with children.

Willamette University Endowment Campaign

The campaign to raise \$100,000 for Willamette University at Salem is well under way. All of the preliminary organization work has been completed and about next week the actual canvass for funds will be undertaken.

This undertaking is backed by the Laymen's Association of the Oregon Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church and funds will, naturally, come chiefly from members of that denomination. However, as others have in the past given generously to the fine old institution which for 75 years has been steadily turning out men and women whose lives have gone far toward making the great Northwest what it is, so no doubt will be the case in this effort adequately to finance Willamette.

While having the heartiest, enthusiastic indorsement of the late Bishop Hughes, who set aside precedent and asked the pastors of the conference to have a special Sunday for Willamette, and the full support of the ministers, the campaign is really a laymen's project. At their conference, held in Salem last October, the delegates unanimously decided to take hold of the situation this year and put over a big job for the school. Therefore, they are directing the work through a special executive committee, backed by a larger advisory board of prominent lay members of the church. Headquarters are at 505 Platt building, Portland.

Funds subscribed will go to enable the trustees to rebuild Waller hall for men and Lausanne hall for a women's dormitory, with installation of a central heating plant, thus clearing up the present crowded condition at the university.

American People Are the Government Declares Mary Rhinehart.

Mary Roberts Rhinehart, noted writer who has entered politics as a candidate for district delegate to the republican national convention from her home near Pittsburg, was asked today to state her views as a representative American woman of the political situation. Summed up, they are:

"This is one of the most critical periods in the country's history. The nation faces a vitally necessary industrial and economic adjustment, in which every man and woman must aid. The basic economic factor is the home and it rests with the women to take the initiative in measures affecting the home. Autocracy of mass is as bad as autocracy of class. The strongest emotion prevailing in the country today is fear of radicalism.

"The people must shake off their political lethargy and realize that they are the government. The only time the United States is a real democracy is when it votes. Every four years the country puts all its eggs in one basket and must take its chances until the next general election. We have been more or less fortunate in selecting our presidents in the past, but we can't afford to make a mistake at this critical period of our national life.

There must be no rubber stamp delegates to the national conventions.

They must reflect the wishes of the people they represent.

"A nation is really not an entity; it is a vast collection of homes. And all national problems must be reduced to the equation of the home."
