EDUCATING THE VOTER.

Voting is serious business, especially where a nomination is almost certain to mean an election. The Oregon system of primaries, where the candidate seeks the office and the voter must decide which of the several is best fitted to serve the public in the desired capacity, makes it obligatory for the voter to inform himself regarding the record and qualifications of the office-seeker. In order to choose safe and intelligent men the voter must be informed.

Doubtless C. C. Chapman had this in mind when he started the Oregon Voter. It is certain there is no publication available that throws so much light on the record, character and general qualifications of so many candidates throughout the state as the Oregon Voter. It is the Literary Digest of the west.

Recent issues of the Voter, it is published weekly in neat magazine form, contain a close, careful, fearless analysis of candidates. Every voter should read these sketches—not that he should swallow blindly all Chapman says. Chapman is not infallible. He sometimes blunders; he admits it. But the Oregon Voter points the way to a more intelligent electorate. We should read, study, analyze, weigh, keep the record on men in office, and men seeking public office of any kind, and then vote according to our best information and most conscientious purpose to advance the best interests of our country, state and nation.

It is poor policy to not know the men you vote to nominate and elect.

VOTE FOR HIM

William E. Metzger, of Corbett, is on the ticket for nomination for representative from Multnomah county, as a republican. Mr. Metzger is a young business man, being president of the Highway Motor Transport Co., and has been a resident of Multnomah county nearly all his life.

Mr. Metzger's slogan is stated in two very terse and commendable words, "Honest Service." That's what the people want and what Mr. Metzger is capable of giving. He says he favors the educational bills, good roads, both highways and market roads. He is loyal to the ex-service man. He is a member of Columbia grange and will do all possible to protect and advance the interests of the farmers.

Mr. Metzger is the right type of man for the legislature. We want as many such as we can elect. He is the only man running for any state position from eastern Multnomah county and this is an additional and a strong reason why men and women voters of all parties, especially in the eastern part of the county, should vote for him. A vote for Metzger will not be misplaced.

FOR DISTRICT JUDGES

There are three departments in the Multnomah county district court, for all of which judges are to be nominated on May 21. Of the several candidates for Department No. 1, Jas Alexander seems to be the most favored candidate for nomination. He is a republican, a former associate of A. E. Clark, and has a clean record. Judge Bell, the present incumbent, who is up for re-election, is a man past 65 and has had a long record as a justice of the peace and has been a district judge more than eight years.

For Department No. 2, of which Judge Jones is the present incumbent, there can be no question that Richard Deich will get the nomination. Deich is well qualified, has had wide experience as an attorney and can be depended upon to protect the people and administer the judgeship with fairness and credit.

There are two candidates for nomination for Department No. 3. Of these two the present incumbent, Martin W. Hawkins is the man who should be nominated and elected. He is a young man of exceptional ability and is above criticism of any kind. He was appointed to the office last January by Governor Oelcott on the resignation of Judge Dayton. There can be no question as to the qualifications of Mr. Hawkins or the fairness and wisdom of nominating him for the position.

D. C. Lewis, candidate for State Senator, was in Gresham this week looking after his political fences. He is one of the men running who has a vision that reaches beyond the city limits of Portland. He is always ready to aid and always has aided the rural districts and understands and appreciates our ideals.

Notice is hereby given that petitions have been presented to the Common Council of the Town of Gresham, Multnomah County, Oregon, requesting the boundaries of the said Town of Gresham be changed so as to include new and additional territory within such boundaries as follows, to-wit:

The West half (1/2) of the Northeast quarter (1/4) of the Northeast quarter (1/4) of section fifteen (15), Township One (1) South, Range Three (3) East of the Willamette Meridian, save and except the following bounded and described tract of land containing one acre beginning at the Southeast corner of above described land, running thence North along the East line thereof sixteen (16) rods; thence West ten (10) rods; thence south sixteen (16) rods; thence east ten (10) rods to the place of beginning, also,

Beginning at a point in the center of the Section Line Road and the West boundary of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C., thence West tracing the said center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C. to the West line of Minnie S. Clanaahans seven and one-half Acre tract of land; thence South crossing the Section Line Road to the South line of C. R. Miller's twenty acre tract of land; thence East to the West boundary line of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the place of beginning, containing twenty-four acres more or less.
