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According to yesterday's Oregon Journal the presidential situation is full of uncertainties, but it looks like McAdoo for the democratic nomination, Governor Lowden for the republican, and Senator Johnson for the third party.

In seeking the office of Secretary of State S. A. Kozier has two outstanding qualifications which commend him to the voters.

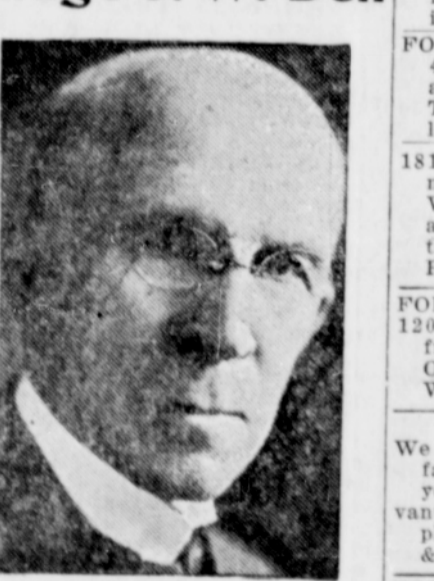
