her sister, Mrs. J. A. Larsson.

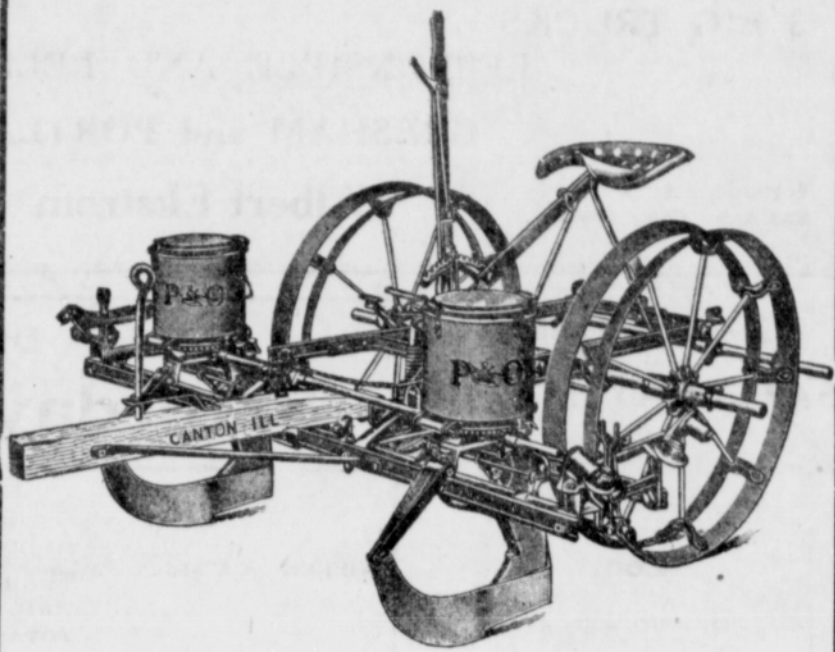
**BORING**
